Gov. McKay, chairman of the Oregon delegation headed the party, which also included three other party officials who are not delegates: Ralph Cate, national committeeman; Jesse Gard, national committeeman-elect; and Hal Short, a member of the Oregon Eisenhower committee.

## Rain Helps State Crops

PORTLAND (AP)—Oregon's crops were benefited by last week's rains and while there was some weather damage, too, it was believed not major.

That was the Wednesday report of the Department of Agriculture and the Weather Bureau. It said the rain saved the strawberry crop from falling short and was beneficial to just about all crops in the Mid-Columbia basin.

Some of the hay crop, down when the rains came, suffered discoloration and reduced quality. Conditions are favorable, though, for a good second hay crop. The outlook for Austrian peas, vetch and grasses also is good, the report said.

There was some frost damage, mostly light, in some eastern and southern areas. Extent of fruit damage in the Rogue River Valley has not been determined.

The rest of the week, the report said, should bring good spraying weather in eastern Oregon except afternoons in the Columbia Gorge near Hood River, and in western interior valleys except for some afternoons with easterly winds.
