United Nations Walkout Brings Communist Gripe

MUNSAN, Korea (AP)—Smarting under an Allied imposed three-day recess, the Reds sent their liaison officers to Panmunjom Wednesday with a complaint that the United Nations walkout was unjustified.

Allied liaison officers countered by telling the Reds that U. N. planes still had found no markings on four Communist prisoner-of-war camps despite Communist assertions that the camps were properly marked.

The exchange took place at a liaison meeting called by the United Nations command.

A letter from the Reds said:

Alaska Crash Victims Found

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP)—Two survivors of a Southeastern Alaska plane crash which claimed two lives Monday were rescued from an isolated glacier late Tuesday night and flown to Anchorage.

Lawrence "Fuzz" Rogers, pilot of the Civil Aeronautics Administration plane on the ill-fated flight, and Dr. Roger Witzel, 32, were admitted to hospitals here.

Rogers was treated for cuts, bruises and burns at Providence Hospital. Dr. Witzel was in an Air Force hospital in serious condition from unannounced injuries.

Mrs. Witzel, 26, a nurse, and Austin Moorehead, a CAA technician, were killed when the plane crashed Monday on a flight from Katala to Yakataga.

Wreckage was sighted by another CAA pilot after an all-day search Tuesday, and four Tenth Rescue Squadron para-medics parachuted to the site of the crash.

Tenth Rescue Squadron helicopters were sent from Cordova to pick up the survivors and bodies of the two victims.

Rogers and Dr. Witzel were brought here from Cordova in an Air Force Albatross plane.

Settlement In Bakery Strike

TACOMA, Wash. (AP)—AFL bakers Tuesday night approved a new contract providing wage increases, premium pay for Sunday work and a health and welfare program and agreed to return to their jobs with the Sunday shift.

The first major break in the 48-day-old strike against wholesale bakeries in three Pacific Northwest cities came as union and management representatives in Seattle and Portland scheduled additional bargaining sessions. They were to meet in the two cities again Wednesday.

Frank Hoover, international representative of the AFL Bakery and Confectionery Workers Union, said the Tacoma agreement provides 40 cents an hour premium pay for Sunday baking; a health and welfare program costing employers \$3.40 a month for men and \$3.90 for women, and 22 cents an hour increase for wrapper, checkers and sanitors (janitors) and 10 cents monthly for miscellaneous classifications.

Pay increases are subject to approval of the Wage Stabilization Board. The health and welfare program will be increased to \$8.66 monthly for all employes within a year.

The union's original contract demands for bakers called for Saturdays and Sundays off. Hoover said the premium pay for Sunday work clause was the first of its kind in the country and the bakers considered it of equal importance to their earlier demands.

The 300 bakers and 500 other workers idled by the strike here will return to work Sunday, Hoover said.

Casualties Near 110,000

WASHINGTON (AP)—Announced U.S. battle casualties in Korea reached 109,971 Wednesday, an increase of 259 since last week.

The Defense Department's weekly summary based on notifications to families through last Friday reported:

Killed in action, 17,318, an increase of two; wounded, 80,136, an increase of 218; and missing, 12,517, an increase of 39.

The breakdown of total casualties by service: Army, 88,993; Navy, 1,383; Air Force, 1,198; and Marine Corps, 18,397.

Plane Crash Kills Four

FAIRBANKS, Alaska (AP)—Three women passengers—two of them Army nurses—died with a civilian pilot in the crash of a small plane north of here Sunday.

The wreckage and bodies were found near the summit of a mountain Monday. The pilot was Morris A. Weiner.

The third woman was an Air Force base librarian.

Long Island RR Strike Ended

NEW YORK (AP)—The Long Island Railroad resumed normal service Wednesday after a two-day engine strike forced thousands of commuters into New York's worst traffic jams in years.

The first rush hour trains to operate on the line since the walk-out started were arriving at Pennsylvania Station without any unusual delays, bringing relief to the harassed Long Island residents.

Settlement of the strike came late Tuesday just as suddenly as the start of the walkout. Full agreement was announced between the road and the striking members of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers Inc., issues involved working conditions and rules.

Early Wednesday the movements bureau of the Long Island, busiest commuter railroad in the nation, said full service had been restored between New York City and the Long Island communities on the line's 400 miles of road-bed.

The Long Island serves an area of more than a million residents.

No Sabotage In Ammo Blast

PUSAN, Korea (AP)—U. S. Army headquarters said Wednesday thorough investigation of the Haeunde ammunition dump fire and explosion Sunday showed no evidence of sabotage.

The official probe into other possible causes is continuing.

One American soldier was killed, four were hospitalized, and 24 were injured in the blasts 13 miles northeast of here.

The Second Logistical Command said two soldiers reported missing had been found uninjured.

Hells Canyon Postponed

WASHINGTON (AP)—A House Interior subcommittee Wednesday voted to postpone indefinitely further hearings on the controversial Hells Canyon Dam on the Idaho-Oregon border.

The effect is to shelve a proposal to authorize construction by the Bureau of Reclamation of the huge Snake River project.

Observers regarded the vote as a victory for private power interests, which contended the project would flood out five sites upon which the Idaho Power Co. wants to build low level dams. Other objections were based on a possible threat to Idaho's reclamation possibilities.

Backers of the proposal contended power revenues from the project would finance a large-scale reclamation program which otherwise could not be undertaken.

Postponement of the hearings was voted on a motion by Rep. Poulson (R-Calif.), who has been active in opposition to the project.

Sixteen members—eight Democrats and eight Republicans—were present when the voice vote was taken. No dissenting vote was heard.
