The association was founded in 1914 to help farm women merchandise their goods. This work is still carried on in Maine, but in the other 10 member states it has been superseded by the other projects. In recent years it has awarded some \$10,000 annually in scholarships to young farm people.

Miss Warren was teaching home economics at Columbia University, her alma mater, and working for a doctorate when she was asked to come to Washington. She helped develop the 4-H citizenship oath, the National 4-H Foundation and National 4-H Club center here, the International Farm Youth Exchange program and the one-year 4-H fellowships in the Department of Agriculture. For her work in this field she has received the Department's superior service award. She has traveled to every state in the union many times over and twice to the Caribbean area to help start 4-H clubs. (4-H stands for "A Head to clearer thinking, a Heart to greater loyalty, Hands to greater service and Health to better living.") The former government of Latvia conferred the Order of the Three Stars on her for the help she gave in starting similar groups in that little country.
