Sanford Blasted As Bevos Dunked

The faded \$100,000 price tag that Portland's Freddy Sanford treasures among his major league souvenirs acquired a bit more midweek Wednesday night.
The one-time Yankee flinger was hit hard and jerked after three innings as Los Angeles notched a 4-3 Pacific Coast League win.
The left-on-base department told the story. Portland had 11 runners stranded, Los Angeles only one.
Lefty Steve Nagy's two hitter gave Seattle a 2-1 victory over Oakland. The only blow off Nagy were Dave Mann's triple and Tookie Gilbert's homer, his eighth of the season. Seattle's first score came when Bill Ayers singled, then went all the way around on a hit-run blow by Manny Fernandez that was bobbled in the outfield. A single and Rocky Krsch's double in the seventh provided the winning run.
Hollywood's Johnny Lindell gave the San Diego Padres only four hits and yet lost a 3 to 1 decision because two men were on base when Lonnie Summers unloaded a fourmaster in the fourth inning.
The Stars gave Lindell miserable support in the field committing four errors. But the ex-Yankee pitched himself out of those jams and has only himself to blame for the "gopher ball" he threw Summers. Lindell himself socked a homer for the only run off lefty Memo Luna.
Elmer Singleton tossed his third shutout of the season as San Francisco beat Sacramento 5-0. Only one batter got as far as third base.
Luke Sewell, now in his third year as manager of the Reds, is the 32nd pilot in the history of the Cincinnati club.

CHICAGO (AP) — After picking up a check for \$3,591.55, which will hardly cover expenses, for defeating Johnny Bratton Wednesday night, rugged Rocky Castellani beat his chest for bigger game and bigger money Thursday.
Castellani, a free-swinging middleweight who left the Luzerne, Pa., coal fields to seek championship pugilistic fortunes, now is yelling for a fight with Rocky Graziano.
"That one will draw the money," said business-like Castellani after taking a 10-round split decision from the Fancy Dan Welterweight of Chicago.
Castellani outweighed Bratton 155 pounds to 149 and defeated him for the second time in three months.

Wenatchee Drops Broncs

The Wenatchee Chiefs eased the Lewiston Broncs out of the Western International League first division Wednesday night.
The Chiefs capped their slow rise through the lower ranks with a 12-6 win over the Broncs and moved into fourth place, two percentage points ahead of the Broncs.
The win gave Wenatchee a 2-0 edge in the three-game series at Wenatchee and also put an end to the Bob Schulte shutout junk. Schulte, ace Lewiston hurler, had blanked the Chiefs the last four times he faced them. He went to the showers in the fifth inning Wednesday night as the Chiefs chased in eight runs.
Pitchers held the spotlight elsewhere in the league, turning in a two-hitter and a pair of shutouts.
TWO-HITTER
Cal McIvry, former Pacific Coast League moundman, tied the two-hitter as Victoria thumped Tri-City 9-1. Spokane veteran John Conant shut out Yakima 3-0 on three hits, and reliable Bob Snyder, a 27-game winner at Vancouver last season, scattered seven hits in blanking Salem 1-0.
McIvry had a shutout until the eighth when Joe Sealise tripled and came home on an outfield fly for Tri-City's only run. Sealise had the only other hit of McIvry, a second-inning ground single. McIvry struck out the next 17 batters.
Victoria and Vancouver trade opponents for new series opening Thursday, with Salem opening at Victoria and Tri-City at Vancouver.

Track Stars Set for AAU

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The 64th annual National AAU Track and Field Championships get underway Friday night with a full slate of champions on deck to defend their titles in this Olympic year of 1952.
Tighter aspirations are combined with hopes of fame in the big games in Finland for all the athletes assembled here. For most of the field the AAU offers a chance to qualify for the final Olympic trials in Los Angeles June 27-28.
Foreign entrants here do not figure in the final trials, and those athletes who placed sixth or better in the National Collegiate at Berkeley last week are already assured of a place in the trials next week.
Track experts figure that at least five crowns are in danger here, insuring a two-day meet crisscrossed with excitement.

Ballots Put Stan on Top

CHICAGO (AP) — Stan Musial, St. Louis Cardinals' slugging outfielder, Thursday increased his lead as the most popular vote getter in the All-Star baseball poll. Musial's total votes rose to 194,787. This gave him an edge of 4,465 over Don DiMaggio, Boston Red Sox center fielder, and 8,633 more than the erstwhile popularity leader, left fielder Hank Sauer of the Chicago Cubs.
The nationwide poll of fans to determine the starting lineups for the All-Star game in Philadelphia July 8 will end at midnight June 27.

Berg, Rawls Out Front

CHICAGO (AP) — An all-Georgia scrap and a battle of teen-agers capped Thursday's quarter finals of the Women's Western Open in which defending champion Betty Berg and medalist Betsy Rawls still overshadowed their brackets.
The Georgia dispute pitted pro Louisa Sugar, three-time meet winner from Atlanta, and Mary Lena Faulk, a dozed amateur from Thomasville, near the Florida border.
Two other amateurs still in contention, 17-year-old Barbara McIntire, Toledo, O., high school junior, and 19-year-old Barbara Romack, sleek Sacramento, Calif., shooter, met in a lower bracket contest.
