## Oregon Garden Clubbers Help Conserve Resources

The Oregon Federation of Garden Clubs, meeting in Portland, in early June for a busy session, approved a number of projects vital to the welfare of natural resources of Oregon.

The Silver Anniversary convention was held in the Multnomah Hotel. Presiding was Mrs. J. George Eisenhauer, state president. Individual garden clubs over the entire state are making a study on helping with conservation of wildlife timber, wild flowers and range.

Each garden club has contributed to a fund to buy seed for one and one-half acres of land for range. The clubs also have under way, purchase of groves of Myrtlewood for presentation to the state as parks in the interest of conserving these last disappearing trees.

A botanical gardens project, said to be one of the largest in the world has also been undertaken by the Oregon Federation of clubs. The project a long range one will take several years to complete.

A scholarship for the most outstanding work in agriculture by a University of Oregon or Oregon

State College student was won by an Oregon girl.

The California Federation of Garden Clubs has purchased acreages of Redwood trees to be presented to the state of California for parks.

The Oregon Federation now has 7000 members and interest in club work is mounting.

Wood, director of the Klamath sub-district, who will act as chairman of the State Federation Year Books for the coming two years; Mrs. Clark Kendall, who served on the balloting committee for the election of officers; Mrs. Fred Karrison, Mrs. M.
