### Claim, Counter Claim, Mark Yakima Rain War Hell's Canyon Hearings Due

A meteorologist whose rain-stopping claims have been disputed by scientists went ahead Wednesday with more "secret chemical" operations he contends will keep rain from cherry crops.  
The meteorologist, Jack Hubbard of Olympia, Wash., said at Yakima, Wash., Wednesday he was preparing counter measures for "the next big cloud invasion."  
The cherry harvest now is at its peak in the Yakima and Wenatchee valleys of Washington. Hubbard has been hired by fruit growers to try to keep rain from spitting the ripening cherries. He's in competition with rain-makers engaged by wheat ranchers.  
Hubbard discussed his anti-rain operations at a meeting of the American Meteorological Society at Corvallis, Ore., Tuesday, but didn't give details.  
All he would say about his procedure was that he uses generators

to release small amounts of his "secret compound" into the air. He said these chemicals have a trigger-like effect in releasing the "undisputed energy" in clouds.  
The "energy state" of cloud formations, he explained, often is so finely balanced that a tiny push one way or the other can dissipate them or turn them into raindrops.  
Scientists who commented indicated they were not impressed.  
Dr. Morris Nieburger, professor of meteorology at the University of California at Los Angeles, called Hubbard's claims "double-talk."  
The Californian said Hubbard's scanty explanation of the technical steps did not follow sound scientific principles.  
Hubbard said at Corvallis his secret method could be used to produce a drought over whole countries, and added the military possibilities were tremendous.  
In Washington, D.C., United States Weather Bureau experts were just as cool toward Hubbard's claims as they have been concerning rain-making operations.  
Dr. Harry Wexler of the Weather Bureau said that if Hubbard has an effective method "he hasn't told it to the government."  
Weather Bureau scientists said they couldn't accept the idea Hubbard could undo something they don't concede others could do in the first place.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Morse (R-Ore.) said Thursday he had been assured that Senate hearings will be held "as soon as feasible" on legislation to authorize construction of Hell's Canyon Dam on the Idaho - Oregon border.  
That may not be before next January, however, he said.  
He made public a letter to Rep. Engle (D-Calif.), chairman of the House interior sub-committee which Wednesday voted to postpone indefinitely further hearings on the controversial Snake River project.  
Morse said he had talked with Sen. O'Mahoney (D-Wyo.), chairman of the Senate Interior Committee, following the House committee action.  
"He told me that he would see to it," Morse said. "That hearings were held just as soon as it was feasible to do so."  
But he said O'Mahoney "doubted if they could be held until after the reconvening of the Congress next January although there was a possibility that some hearings in the field might be held some time during the fall."  
Morse's letter to Engle accompanied copies of the senator's two recent speeches on the Senate floor ardently supporting the construction of the dam.

### Ingrid Happy About Twins

ROME (AP) — A wan and weary Ingrid Bergman shed tears of joy Thursday as she got her first good look at her day-old twin daughters, Isabel, seven pounds three ounces, and her younger sister by half an hour — eight-pound five-ounce Ingrid Jr. — dozed in fitful unconsciousness of their international publicity.  
Sharing his wife's joy, after a night-long vigil at her bedside in the flower-packed hospital room was Roberto Rossellini, for whose love the blonde Swedish film star abandoned her husband and a Hollywood career.  
The twins, two weeks overdue, were born Wednesday night at the fashionable Salvatore Mundi Hospital.  
The 35-year-old mother was reported doing well.  
Dr. Pier Luigi Guidotti, who assisted in the birth, said the film star "cried when she saw her babies and was happy because they were perfect babies and just what her husband wanted."  
Messengers delivered congratulations from all parts of the world and telephone calls clogged the hospital switchboard.

### Drinking Bout Ends In Killing

ROSEBURG (AP) — Daniel Webster Smith, 70, Camas Valley, Wednesday was convicted of manslaughter by a jury that deliberated just two hours.  
Smith was convicted in the death May 12 of John Henry Jenkins, 37. Smith said he and Jenkins got into a quarrel after drinking together and he got out a shotgun to frighten Jenkins, who was found later, dead of wounds.  
Smith will be sentenced later. Manslaughter carries a term of 1 to 15 years.

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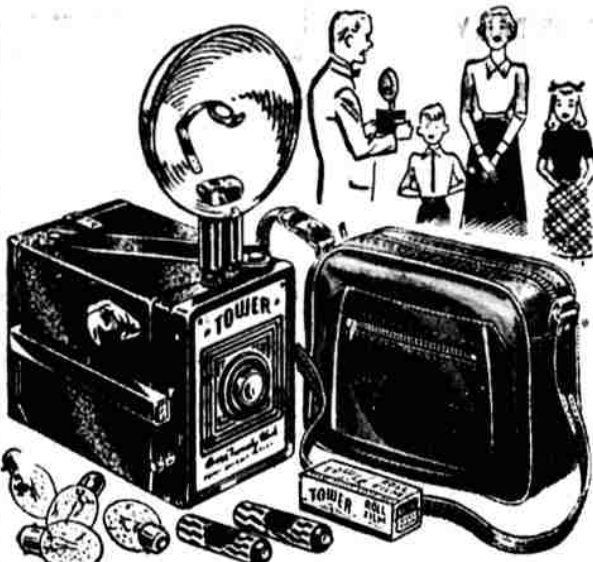
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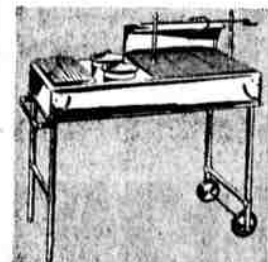


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## Kefauver Takes 70 Percent of Demo Vote

SALEM (AP) — Sen. Estes Kefauver of Tennessee got 71.9 per cent of the Democratic vote in Oregon's May 16 presidential primary.  
A pre-election Associated Press poll showed Kefauver with 71.6 per cent of the vote—only .3 of a per cent from the official figures announced Tuesday.  
Kefauver's total was 142,440. Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas was second with 29,532 and Illinois Gov. Stevenson, third with 20,333. Douglas and Stevenson were unwilling candidates.  
Douglas led for vice president with 1,996 write-in votes. California's Republican Gov. Warren got 1,280 write-ins.  
Oregon's delegates to the Democratic convention are bound to a Kefauver-Douglas ticket as long as it appears those candidates have a chance.  
The AP poll gave Douglas 14.9 per cent of the vote. He got only 10. Stevenson was expected to get 18.4 but got only 10.3.  
Gen. Eisenhower, the choice of the state's Republican voters, had 4,690 Democratic write-ins for President, or 2.4 per cent of the vote.  
Mrs. Lillian M. Burton defeated

Mrs. Margaret Cawood \$2,215 to \$8,135 in the contest for Democratic national committeewoman. In unofficial returns after the election, Mrs. Cawood had held a narrow lead. Both are from Portland.  
Democratic National Committeeman Monroe Sweetland, Milwaukie, won reelection easily, beating Mike M. DeCicco, Portland tire dealer, 138,287 to 61,765.  
The four delegates at large to the Democratic National Convention are Sheriff Terry D. Schunk, Portland; Sweetland; State Treasurer Walter J. Pearson, and State Sen. Thomas R. Mahoney, both of Portland.  
The delegates from congressional districts are: First District, Roy R. Hewitt, Salem, and James R. Shick, Forest Grove; Second, Gene B. Conklin, Pendleton, and Harry D. Bolvin, Klamath Falls; Third, Joseph K. Carson Jr. and Nicholas Granel, both of Portland; fourth, Walter H. Dodd Eugene, and Dave Epps, Sweet Home.  
The only surprise in the official count for convention delegates was the election of Shick in the First District. He nosed out Margaret Coates, Tillamook, who had been leading in the unofficial count.

There were 198,143 votes cast for President, or 82.13 per cent of the number of registered voters. This percentage was slightly higher than the 80 per cent vote that had been predicted.

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
