A milestone in Klamath agricultural financial history will be passed with the grand opening of the new Klamath Federal Credit Association offices here tomorrow.

The KPCA, a former owned financial institution, last week moved its offices from the First Federal Savings Bldg. at 6th and Main to the Farrell Bldg. at 9th and Main.

The new KPCA home was recently completely remodeled, and office space has about been doubled according to Secy-Treas, Lee McMullen.

Tomorrow's opening will be from 1 to 5 p.m., with offices open to inspection by the public. About 300 persons are expected, and coffee and cookies are to be served, as well as punch.

Members of the KPCA board of directors are slated to be on hand, as well as Past Pres. Bill Kittredge, who association officers have said has done more for the institution than any other one man.

Kittredge was president for 18 years, retiring this past year from the chairman's seat.

Dry-Maker To Support Claims

YAKIMA (AP) — The chief "dry-maker" in the Yakima Valley rain wars says he is going to take pictures to prove he does what he claims.

Meteorologist Jack Hubbard of Olympia says he has powerful chemicals that can cause a big threatening rain cloud to fold up and silently steal away without spilling a drop.

He said Wednesday he would prove his claims to doubters. He said he would have his men set up equipment under blue skies to form a cloud. With his cloud dispersing chemicals Hubbard vowed he will slice the cloud in half, then wipe it out.

The test was proposed as a result of some doubt in meteorological circles whether Hubbard can do what he claims.
