

Innocent Bystander Killed by Rifle Shot

GOLD BEACH, Ore. (AP) — A 27-year-old mill worker was shot dead Wednesday in a quarrel between two other men in northern Curry County.

A bullet struck Marius Christian Sorenson, 27, in the heart as he sat at the wheel of an automobile on the Sixes River road, 40 miles north of here.

A. D. Niemann, Port Orford justice of the peace, said a 64-year-old dairy rancher, James Kav Nodine, admitted the fatal bullet came from his carbine. Nodine is being held here.

Also involved was Clifford A. Shields, 29, lumber mill operator and employer of Sorenson. Shields said Nodine was trying to shoot him when Sorenson was struck. He said Nodine did not even know Sorenson. He gave this version:

Nodine was irate because Nodine's 14-year-old daughter had come to live with Shields, his wife and their four children. Sorenson was driving Shields to the mill when Nodine stopped them on the road 7 1/2 miles from the Coast Highway.

Nodine walked over to the car, cursed Shields and fired. Shields talked Nodine out of further shooting, then drove Sorenson to a Bandon hospital. Sorenson was dead by the time they got there.

Niemann said Nodine walked into his office and said he wanted a doctor for a man he had shot. Niemann said Nodine told this story:

After he stopped the car, he walked over and asked Shields where his daughter was. When there was no answer, he raised his gun and said, "Maybe this will make you remember."

Sorenson reached out to grab the gun, which fired in the ensuing scuffle, Nodine said. He added that Shields then slid behind the wheel and raced away in the car. Nodine then drove to Port Orford. Niemann called Fred Jamieson, Curry County deputy sheriff, who took Nodine in custody.

Plywood Plan Merger Due

SEATTLE (AP) — The Georgia-Pacific Plywood Co., one of the largest plywood producers in the United States, announced late Wednesday it has proposed a merger with Harbor Plywood Corp., Aberdeen, Wash.

The announcement was made through the Seattle office of Blyth and Co., Inc., Pacific Coast investment banking firm.

The proposal, made to Martin N. Deguelier, Harbor Plywood president, called for an exchange of 47 shares of Harbor Plywood common stock for one-half share of Georgia-Pacific common plus \$6 cash.

On the basis of Wednesday's market close, Harbor Plywood stockholders would receive approximately \$16 a share. The stock is currently quoted at around \$12.50.

Deguelier declined comment on whether he would submit the proposal to Harbor Plywood directors for consideration.

The Aberdeen firm has more than a billion board feet timber reserve in the Lewis River area of Southwest Washington. This reserve was considered in financial circles here as the primary objective of Georgia-Pacific in proposing the merger.

Georgia-Pacific, with headquarters in Atlanta, has a number of plants in Washington and Oregon.

UN May Study Germ Charge

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — A full-scale battle over germ warfare appeared to be shaping up in the United Nations Thursday after the United States denounced Russia's latest move as a fraud.

The new Soviet proposal was a request that the U.N. Security Council appeal to the United States and several other countries to ratify the 1925 Geneva protocol outlawing bacteriological weapons.

Soviet Delegate Jacob A. Malik presented his resolution with a brief, mildly worded speech carefully avoiding any mention of previous Communist charges that the U.S. had used germ warfare in Korea.

Both delegates and audience — Americans — listened in amazement as the usually sharp-tongued Malik made his appeal in soft tones and conciliatory words.

Despite Malik's avoidance of the Korean issue, U.S. Delegate Ernest A. Gross harked back to the earlier Communist charges as soon as he got the floor to reply.

Gross said the Communist charges of germ warfare were part of a campaign of lies and that there was no evidence this campaign had been abandoned.

Malik and Gross promised to make detailed statements later. The council will resume the debate Friday.

Fishermen To Alaska

ASTORIA (AP) — Some 4,000 fishermen and cannery workers will be flown from West Coast ports to Alaska this week in the biggest hurry-up in the fishing industry has known.

The salmon fishing season opens June 25 and the Bering Sea areas can be reached in time only by plane. The workers' start was delayed because of a price dispute. Packers and the Alaska Fishermen's Union reached agreement only Monday.

Use of planes for cannery workers has been general in recent years but officials of the Columbia River Packers Association here said never before had so many been moved in so short a time.

The CRPA, which converted a number of sail boats to gasoline to take advantage of federal law which for the first time permits powered skiffnet boats in Bristol Bay this year, reported that it plans to operate in Southeastern Alaska in the August season.

Pickets Halt Plane Output

CINCINNATI (AP) — Production of 47 per cent of the Air Force's jet engines for fighter planes stopped at the General Electric Co. plant Thursday when some 10,000 workers refused to cross picket lines.

The lines were set up by AFL-Machinists, company officials said after a strike was called after contract negotiations flopped.

Mine contractual differences are over a union shop, a 10 per cent wage increase and elimination of a work classification system, a spokesman said.

No Limits On Wheat Crop

WASHINGTON (AP) — Because of uncertain world conditions, American farmers can grow all the wheat they want to in 1953 despite an expected surplus this year.

Secretary of Agriculture Brannan said Thursday the international situation makes it advisable to produce as much wheat as possible to help feed friendly nations and to maintain supplies for defense purposes.

For example, he said, some surplus wheat might be used in making alcohol for producing synthetic rubber.

Brannan said this year's indicated near-record crop of 1,326,000 bushels—second largest on record and a third larger than last year—normally would force him to order controls to hold down production.

McKay To See Governors

SALEM (AP) — Gov. Douglas McKay will leave next Wednesday for Houston, Tex., to attend the annual National Conference of State Governors, he said Thursday.

The conference will be held from June 29 to July 2. Then he will go direct to Chicago for the Republican national convention.

Mrs. McKay will make the trip with him. Miss Alene Phillips, his secretary, also will attend the conference and convention.

Extreme Pressure Recorded At Bottom of the Ocean

Associated Press Science Reporter CORVALLIS, Ore. (AP) — Pressure is so great in the extreme depths of the Pacific Ocean that it apparently has forced water through a half-inch thick glass wall.

It pulverizes parts of scientific instruments with implacable explosions, a process widely described unofficially as steps in an atom bomb blast.

Pen Guard Reinstated

SALEM (AP) — A demoted state penitentiary guard got his sergeant's job back Thursday after the State Civil Service Commission ruled there was no evidence to show he disobeyed an order.

The commission recommended to Warden Virgil O'Malley that he restore Carl Watson to his former sergeant status, and the warden said he would do so.

Watson was the only guard with a 24-convict woodcutting crew which was working near Albany late in April when two of the convicts ran away.

O'Malley reduced Watson to ordinary guard rank on the ground that Watson disobeyed a new order that such convicts had to be kept under constant supervision.

Watson, who split up the 24-man crew into small groups and hence couldn't see them at all times, said he never received the order.

Watson, who has worked for the prison six years, appealed to the Civil Service Commission, which heard his case Wednesday.

W. C. Ryan, state supervisor of institutions, told the commission that Watson is "a faithful, honest, very valuable employe, and I wish we had many, many more like him."

It has squeezed the stretch out of rubber. It has broken or distorted the most rugged thermometers and defeated the attempts of scientists to take the temperature of the greatest depths.

These were among the difficulties reported by the American Association for the Advancement of Science here by Dr. Claude Zobel of the Scripps Institution of Oceanography at La Jolla, Calif.

The weird tricks of high pressure were experienced by the deep sea expedition carried by the Danish warship Galathea which recently completed a survey of the great trenches at the bottom of the Southwestern Pacific. Dr. Zobel was one of the scientists aboard.

The glass which seemingly was penetrated by water was in the form of spheres the size of baseballs. These spheres have small hollow cores.

They are lowered to the ocean bottom and deliberately broken with an iron weight to produce a small explosion as a signal to observers at the surface.

Some of these balls were lowered into the Mindanao trench off the Philippines which is about six miles deep and has a bottom pressure of about 15,000 pounds per square inch.

They were not smashed but were brought back to the surface intact. Some of them were found to contain water.

Dr. Zobel said they showed no signs of structural defect and that the water must have been pushed through their walls by the high pressure. Special arrangements

are being made to open them. Precautions will have to be taken because of the pressure inside them probably is tremendous.

Expensive thermometers encased in heavy glass and metal were broken or distorted before they reached bottom. The glass was crushed into chips of fine powder.
