The Klamath Summer Art Workshop took a more concrete form this week when Louis Bunce, who will teach the painting and graphic arts classes, came to town to discuss plans for the four week session which will be from July 7 to August 1.

Mr. Bunce was greatly inspired by the great abundance of natural beauty and interesting material that can be used as subject matter for sketching and painting. Although Mr. Bunce is coming primarily to teach the painting class in the afternoon session, many of us were desirous to have him teach a class in serigraphy in the evening. This he has very generously consented to do.

A serigraph print is obtained by using the silk screen method of printing, but not limiting the method by using only ink. In cutting our stencils as most of us have been doing. The difference being that by applying different materials to the screen itself by brush, crayon etc., a wider variety of effects can be created, and many different colors used, because many limits can be made of the same picture and anyone can learn to do it easily.

Mr. Bunce plans to give demonstrations and introduce simplified methods in his classes to that both beginners and advanced students can attend. He is considered one of the finest serigraphers in the country and is on the way to becoming famous for perfecting the technique and popularity of this time and easy printing method.

We are indeed fortunate to have been able to engage such a master painter and print-maker to spend here this summer. In his company and after many hours spent in the discussion of his philosophy of painting, we are convinced that those who attend his classes will learn an entirely new approach to the subject of painting.

Anyone who wishes further information on the summer school and who wishes to see the prints, paintings and crafts of the artists to attend the reception at the Art Center Monday evening, June 23, at eight o'clock.

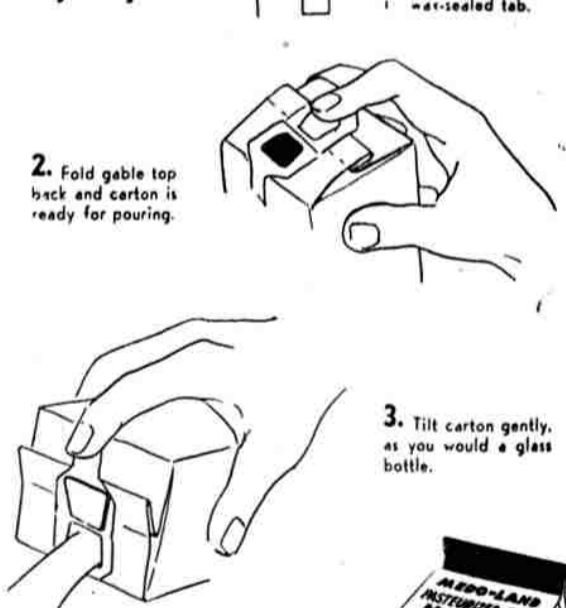
