AAU Gets New Champs

LONG BEACH, Calif. (AP) — Four new champions graced the National AAU record book and fresh fireworks were in store Saturday after an opening show that enhanced America's chances in the Olympic games and produced many surprises and a pair of mishaps.

The 64th annual meet, an important one in this Olympic year, comes to a close Saturday with 12 events on the program.

Highlights of Friday night's five-hour card included:

The defeat of world record holder George Horner in the 400 meters by Mel Whitfield—a spectacular upset in 46.4.

The 10,000 meter victory by Curtis Stone over Fred Wolf for a new American record of 30:33.4—a time that would have brought America second place in the 1948 Olympics. It was the fastest an American has ever run the event. Wolf did 30:38.4 in Oslo in 1949, and set the old AAU record of 31:05.7 in 1949.

Perry O'Brien's successful defense in the shotput and his victory in the 400 meter hurdles over world champion Jim Fuchs, accomplished with a new meet mark. O'Brien hit 57 feet 4 1/2 inches to Fuchs' 56-7 1/2, and broke Fuchs' record made in 1949, of 57-2 1/2.

The defending champion, Charlie Moore's, expected win in the 400 meter hurdles in the good time of 51.2, and Bill Miller's javelin victory at 236 feet 1 inch.

The new champions are Whitfield, Dean Smith in the 100 meters, Miller in the javelin and Thomas Bane in the hammer throw.

The big mishap struck down defending champion Jim Golliday of semi-final heat of the 100 meters. He pulled up with a groin injury. He has already qualified for the all important Olympic final trials at Los Angeles next Friday and Saturday, having won the NCAA title a week ago. But whether he will be able to compete for his place on the team remains to be seen. Loss of Golliday would hurt badly.

The other accident victim was Princeton's Albin Rauch, a sure thing bet in the 400 meter hurdles for the U.S. team and a place at Helsinki. Rauch, disqualified at the NCAA meet, lost his last chance when a muscle injury forced him out of the event Friday night.

Today's bill lists 12 events, featuring the 110-meter hurdles, the 200, 800 and 1,500 meter runs, the 500 yard and the pole vault.

Rawls Seeks Open Crown

CHICAGO (AP) — Elizabeth Earle Rawls, the 19th Beta Kappa rolling girl known as Betty, Saturday for her first Women's Western Open crown in an all-Texas pro showdown with her meet jinx, rebounding Betty Jameson.

Miss Rawls, who nearly has stroked to her first \$10,000 this year in a sophomore year, making her fourth stab at the Western Open title. Her best was a quarterfinal surge in 1951.

In two other shots, Betsy was knocked out early by the sister pro from the Lone Star state she encounters in Saturday's all-Ohio championship match at Skokie Country Club.

Fresh from winning the \$5,000 Weanervane country, Miss Rawls Friday polished off three-time Western champion Louise Suggs, 2 and 1, after burping by two holes going into the sixth. Her quarterfinal victim was another veteran pro, Percy Kirk.

Betty toyed with 19-year-old Barbara Romack, Sacramento, Calif., amateur Friday over Skokie's rain-deluged acreage for a 4 and 3 victory.

In the quarterfinals, Miss Jameson had ended Patty Berg's quest for a record fifth open crown with a 5 and 3 victory. Betty's first two conquests were 7 and 6 walkovers.

Wolfe Lifts Turner's Crown

Fans Boo Split Decision

Indian Dick Wolfe took Earl Turner's Northwest middleweight crown here last night on a split decision that touched off thunderous boos from a jam-packed Army crowd.

Even Harry Eagles, Wolfe's manager, disagreed with the decision. A few minutes after the fight, Eagles sought out this reporter and said:

"The decision was wrong. My boy (Wolfe) got beat tonight. We don't want anything we don't deserve. Turner can have a chance to get his title back anytime, anyplace. My boy fought a great fight and I'm proud of him, but he didn't win tonight," concluded Eagles.

QUICK START

It was a tale of a fight from the opening bell. The first blow, a whistling left thrown by Wolfe, drew blood and from then on, except for brief slowdowns in mid-fight, it was as brutal a battle as you're ever likely to see.

Time after time, the two battlers stood toe-to-toe and slugged it out. Neither would give ground and neither would go down. But Turner seemed to be landing oftener and appeared to have Wolfe in trouble a couple of times.

On this reporter's unofficial card, the fight was six rounds Turner, two Wolfe and two even.

Judge Floyd Wynne, who balloted in favor of the champ, called it five Turner, two Wolfe and three even.

NEW WEAPON

Wolfe fought a fine fight and came up with a vastly improved right hand. In his previous fights here, the strong Indian has relied on his murderous left hook. But last night he frequently jarred the unsuspecting Turner with a powerful straight right.

Turner's ring generalship made the difference. The California Negro is perhaps as polished a fighter as has ever appeared here. And he's a sterling sportsman. Immediately following the fight, while he was still in the ring, Turner smiled softly and refrained from berating on the dubious decision that cost him his title. Instead, he praised Wolfe.

"He's a real good boy," said Turner. "I tried hard to knock him out but he just wouldn't go down."

GOOD TURNOUT

The championship card drew a big house with many standees in the balconies.

As a novel opener, Promoter Mack Lillard offered two school-age amateurs in a three-rounder. The boys, John Boels, Tulelake, and Junior Daniels, Klamath Falls, drew a big hand from the fans.

In the serious fighting, Bruce Miller, Clifton, and Kid Pollard, Willow Ranch, slugged their way to a draw. It was a good bout and had the fans in an uproar several times.

The second bout, also a draw, pitted Rudy Carlson against Darrell Harrington. The two Klamath Falls boxers went after each other hammer and tongs and drew a rousing hand from the crowd.

POLISH
George Price, the popular Merrill fighter now home on leave from the Navy, went four rounds with Paul Kennedy, good looking Los Angeles Negro. This one had the polish of a main-event attraction. Both boys looked sharp and smart. It was a no-decision affair, so designed to protect Price's amateur status as the welterweight champ at his Navy base.

Ralph Weiser, the Beatty fighter, scored an unanimous decision over Bobby Dahl, of Boise. Dahl took a lot of punishment and dished out scarcely any at all.

Promoter Lillard said this morning there was a possibility of re-matching Wolfe and Turner here this summer.
