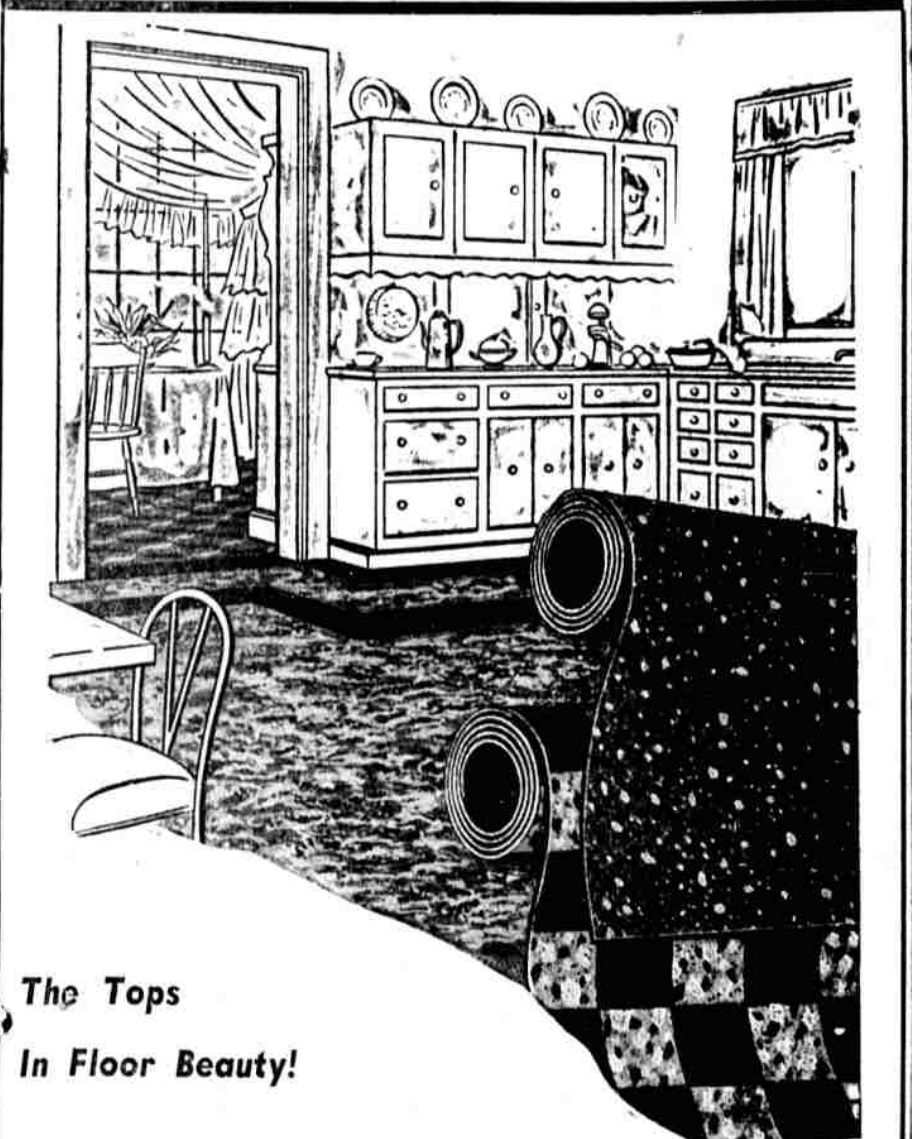
Replacement For Reese Taylor
