Wooten Signed by Brooklyn

Medford Rook Gets Fat Bonus

MEDFORD, Ore. (AP)—An 18-year-old Medford rookie pitcher was signed by the Brooklyn Dodgers Saturday. The Dodgers agreed to a bonus of five figures for Derald Wooten, his father, Lloyd Wooten, said. The 6 foot 2 inch hurler graduated from high school here this spring. He had a record of 35 wins and 6 defeats in high school and American Legion baseball. Wooten was the third Oregon rookie signed for major league baseball in recent weeks. Jerry Zimmerman, Milwaukee Ori. catcher reportedly received a \$75,000 from the Boston Red Sox. Wooten also signed Eddie Urena, The Dalles, Ore., pitcher for a sum estimated by Portland newspapers as between \$50,000 and \$75,000. Wooten will be farmed to the Great Falls, Mont., club of the Class C Pioneer League.

The sleek, clever, power-punching middleweight king was rated an even money choice to overcome a 15 or 16 pound weight handicap and join Rube Roper, Fitzsimmons (middleweight), heavyweights, light heavyweights and Hammerin' Henry Armstrong (feather, light, welter) in the ultra-exclusive ranks of "three-dive" winners.

Open Champion Boros Proves Inadequacy of Golf Statute

NEW YORK (AP)—There is little hope that the average golf fan will ever understand the five-year apprenticeship rule which Julius Boros, the new Open champion, collided, and which eventually caused the Connecticut star to withdraw from the present PGA title event at Louisville. In recent days we have been advised perhaps a dozen times that the statute so zealously defended by the professionals is silly and outdated, and have been asked the same number of times why we don't take the hide off the PGA without a moment's rest, permitting it to remain on their books. In case you didn't follow the tribulations of Boros, the facts, briefly are these: A comparative unknown, the big fellow slipped in to win the Open at Dallas after Ben Hogan, the favorite, faltered in the closing rounds. It was discovered within a matter of minutes that Julius had been a pro for only a couple of years and would not, therefore, be eligible to compete in the PGA private birdie hunt. This appeared to embarrass the PGA and it quickly took a wire vote of its officers to see if they were willing to make an exception in Julius' case. They were, and the new Open king was invited to have a go at Louisville. The happy apprentice, still somewhat dazed from his sudden eminence, whipped over to the four-hour capital and shined up his clubs. But then he began hearing things over the top of lockers. His fellow professionals, it seems were violently unhappy at the thought of playing against an upstart who didn't belong to the lodge. He even heard profanity. So Julius crawled quietly into his car again and lit out for home, leaving the field to his betters. NOT PRETTY It isn't a pretty story, certainly, but before the pros are condemned out of hand it might be fair to show their side of the picture, to explain why they still want a player to serve five years in a secondary capacity before he received his card as a practicing professional. They concede freely that, in a sense, the rule is outdated. Originally, the apprentice pro devoted five years to sweeping out the shop and learning to make golf clubs. Nowadays clubs are turned out on assembly lines in spotless plants two blocks away. The modern star of the money circuit is expected only to sign testimonials as to their effectiveness.

Amazing Sox In Second

Larry (Yogi) Berra's ability to fill the departed Joe DiMaggio's shoes is the big reason why the New York Yankees are winging their way to their fourth successive American League pennant. The slugging catcher, off to a ragged start due to a hand injury, has been hotter than a hundred degrees in the dugout during the past two weeks. As a result, the Yankees have swept past both Cleveland and the Boston Red Sox into first place. It was a four-bagger by Berra Sunday that snapped a six-inning scoreless duel between Billy Pierce of the Chicago White Sox and Bob Kuzava of the Yankees, and gave him the home run leadership of the league at 14. The Yankees went on to win the opener, 3-0, and lost the second, 2-1, but retained their two-game lead when the fourth place Indians swept a twin bill from the Red Sox, 7-0 and 8-4. The split also proved a boon to the White Sox who jumped into second place, a half game in front of the Red Sox and Indians.
