

Committee Wants Counties To Pay O & C Development

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate Appropriations Committee wants Western Oregon counties to foot the bill for timber access road construction in the O & C timber lands.

It included a provision which has the effect of the Interior Department appropriation bill Monday. The bill included 2 3/4 million dollars for the O & C road construction by the Bureau of Land Management. The recommendation would make the road costs a reimbursable charge against the O & C fund. It is designed to meet House criticism of the current division of funds between the government and the Oregon counties.

MD Testifies In Kader Case

PORTLAND (AP) — Sherrie Kader died of asphyxiation, a physician testified Monday at the first degree murder trial of the child's mother, Mrs. Juda Kader.

The House has refused to appropriate O & C road monies until the government gets a bigger share of money from timber sales on O & C lands. The counties have been getting 50 per cent of the receipts. The government has been getting 45 per cent, out of which it pays various O & C operating costs. The remaining 25 per cent has gone to the government to reimburse it for money paid out in reclaiming the land from the Oregon and California Railroad and for payments it made to the counties in lieu of taxes when receipts didn't offset the counties' tax losses.

Fire Damages Portland School

PORTLAND (AP) — A fire, believed started from defective wiring, did \$10,000 damage to Jefferson High School here Monday.

The blaze, which swept up a waste paper chute, burned through partitions of four classrooms. The school was closed for summer vacation.

Pending completion of an audit split. The House then went along with the Senate in approving \$700,000 in road monies. Th Cordon bill, however, has not been acted upon and the House is balking again.

It's the second time in as many years the Senate has had to deal with the House criticism of the O & C distribution. Last year, when the House also denied access road funds, Sen. Cordon (R-Ore), an Appropriations Committee member, met the objection by introducing a bill to retain the 50-50

Yes Oregon Milk Control compels stores to charge as much for cash-and-carry milk as you pay for home delivery—a requirement in which Oregon stands almost alone among the 48 states.

Among cities of Portland's size or larger, 92% have lower prices for milk bought in stores, with an average saving of 1 1/2 cents a quart. Portland is the only such city west of the Mississippi where store and delivered prices are the same. The six cities where store customers save most are:

Minneapolis... 4c	Chicago... 2 1/2c
Washington, D.C... 3c	Kansas City... 2 1/2c

Oregon Milk Control has not permitted the consumer to benefit from such savings made possible by efficient distribution.

Lower store prices are possible in Portland, too. This fact was disclosed by Oregon State College's two investigations of distributing and retailing costs for the Milk Control authorities published in 1951 and 1952. These cost studies show:

1. Milk could have been profitably priced an average of two cents lower by half the stores surveyed (most of them independent stores) when supplied by half the wholesalers studied.
2. A four cent saving could actually have been passed on to consumers by Portland's most efficient independent store, supplied by Portland's most efficient wholesaler.

The questions and answers below show some other ways in which Oregon Milk Control affects YOU.

Q. Does Milk Control limit the richness of milk? A. Yes. The richness (butterfat content) of milk sold in each price range is limited by the rulings of the Milk Administrator.	Q. Does the Oregon Milk Control Law regulate Sanitary conditions? A. No. It has absolutely nothing to do with the sanitation, health inspection, cleanliness, or the purity of milk.
Q. Does Milk Control set the price you must pay? A. Yes. That is the purpose for which the law was designed. It sets floor prices, not ceiling prices.	Q. Does Milk Control limit the supply of Grade A milk? A. Yes. To sell Grade A milk for your use a farmer must first get permission from the Administrator. If he gets permission (and many do not), he is given a quota. If he produces more he must often sell the surplus at a lower price for cheese or other factory uses.
Q. Does Milk Control discourage competitive distribution of milk? A. Yes. No one can enter the milk business if the Administrator says such new competition might disturb existing distributors.
