Government Lifts Ban On Color Television

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government Tuesday lifted its ban on the manufacture of color television sets for home and theater use.

The National Production Authority (NPA) replaced the outright prohibition with an order permitting manufacture by firms which can prove that color TV will not obstruct their defense output.

However, Administrator Henry H. Fowler who signed the order, said he expected that few makers of radio and TV sets for homes would be able to qualify because most are deeply in defense work.

"It will give an opportunity to those manufacturers whose defense contracts are on schedule and those having no defense contracts to demonstrate that their production of color TV equipment will not impair the defense effort," Fowler said.

Only the Columbia Broadcasting System was making sets commercially when the blackout on color TV was imposed last November 20 by order of former Mobilization Director Charles E. Wilson.

CBS suspended production and also halted its color telecasts, the only ones on the air.

Color development work has continued, however, and other companies have been pressing NPA for relaxation of the order.

Fowler said industry spokesmen have informed NPA that most producers are heavily engaged in defense work on radar, radio and electronics for the armed forces.

First reaction in industry circles in New York was that the NPA order would have little or no effect.

PNW Needs Rail Cars

SPOKANE (AP) — The Pacific Northwest will need more than a quarter of a million railroad cars in the third quarter of this year to haul its products to market, the Northwest Advisory Board estimated Tuesday.

Pete Stallock, the board's vice president, said an estimated 274,385 cars will be needed as compared with 271,235 actually used during the third quarter of 1951.

Lumber and forest products will require by far the most with an estimated total of 173,055, up 3.5 per cent. Grain will require 16,876, a drop of 12 per cent, and fresh fruits 5,989, up 10.5 per cent, he said.

Tax Profit In Development

PORTLAND (AP) — Redevelopment of slum areas is paying off in increased tax returns, the U.S. Chamber of Commerce conference on planning was told here Tuesday.

Nathaniel S. Keith, director of the federal agency for slum clearance and urban redevelopment, said the program is being adopted in 165 cities. Fifty-four already have projects underway and another 111 are selecting sites for redevelopment projects, he said.

These reports on redevelopment projects were given in Detroit.

The project area which in tax revenues will yield an estimated \$341,000 in revenue.

New York City—Four development projects return \$930,000 a year in taxes. Further development will increase this to \$2,899,000.

St. Paul, Minn.—Some 75 acres have been cleaned up and work has begun on another 125 acres.

Max S. Wherly, Washington, D. C., director of the Urban Land Institute, said cities should also consider commercial redevelopment if they are to bring their business centers back to life.

G. Donald Kennedy, Chicago industrialist, said that along with this new development must come new traffic organization plans. Los Angeles with its extensive express highways, is an example of proper traffic planning, he said.

Presbyterians Ask Race Ban

PORTLAND (AP) — A ban on parimutuel betting was called for Tuesday by the Presbyterian Synod of Oregon.

The group, holding its 62nd annual session here, approved a resolution urging support of the Oregon Council of Churches' initiative campaign against dog and horse race betting.

State Sen. Philip S. Hitchcock of Klamath Falls is chairman of the committee which presented the resolution.

In other action Tuesday delegates commended the U. S. Supreme Court for upholding the practice of permitting release of students from school for religious instruction.

The session will continue through Thursday.
