Funeral services were held at the Fort Klamath Methodist Church, Thursday afternoon, June 19, for the late Opal Georgia Page.

Officiating were Rev. C. Ellery Echlin, pastor of Ft. Klamath and Chiloquin Methodist Churches, and Cascade Crest Chapter No. 159, Order of Eastern Star, Chiloquin. Three solos were sung during the services.

The body was shipped from Klamath Falls Thursday evening by rail to Portland for cremation.

Here for the final rites were Mrs. Page's brother and his wife, Mr. and Mrs. Vere Smyth, Portland; her brother-in-law and sister, Mr. and Mrs. Frank (Lois) Leone, San Anselmo, California.

Although she had been painfully afflicted with arthritis for some time, Mrs. Page's passing on Sunday, June 15, was unexpected and came as a great shock to the entire community as well as to friends elsewhere.

She was born in Fairmount, North Dakota, December 27, 1905, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Norman Smyth.

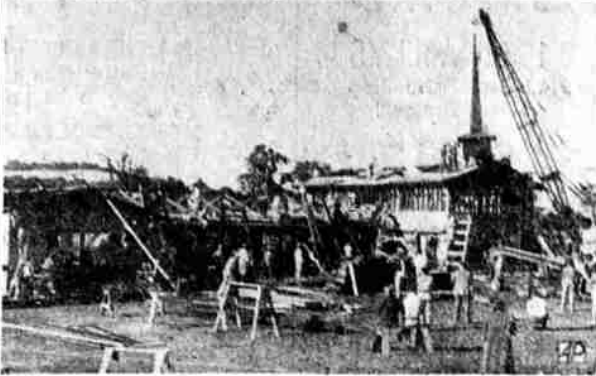
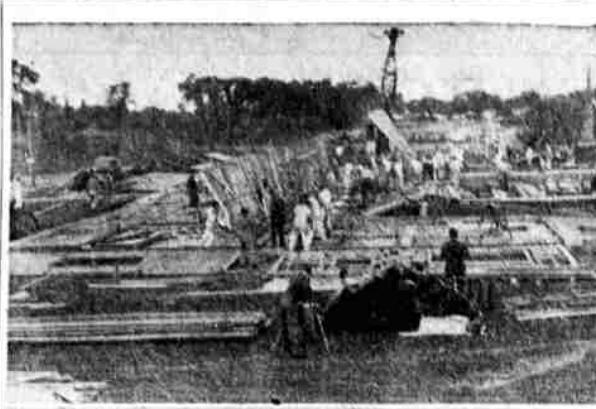

SP Asks For Stock Split

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Southern Pacific Company Tuesday asked the Interstate Commerce Commission to approve a two-for-one split of its common stock. The proposal was approved by the board of directors on May 22 and will be submitted to stockholders for ratification at a special meeting called for August 9 at Wilmington, Del. The company told the ICC the proposal, doubling the number of outstanding shares, "will produce a price for the shares which initially will be in popular price range" and thus increase the number of public stockholders.
