for a dam to be known as Big Bend No. 2. It would be the initial project of a proposed much larger hydroelectric development by Copco on the Klamath River.

Also to be placed before the Federal Power Commission are the signatures of hundreds of property owners in Klamath County apposed to a resolution initiated by the local Butcher Union asking that the Copco permit be granted. The resolution points out published statements of the power company that irrigation water users will be guaranteed full and prior rights to the water.

That resolution got further backing, an endorsement of the Oregon Federation of Labor, at the labor organization's recent state convention, and a resolution from the federation office probably will also be placed before the power commission.

Interest High For Soil Meet

CHILOQUIN—A heavy interest is expected for tonight's hearing on the proposed inclusion of Northern Klamath County lands into the Poor Valley Soil Conservation District.

The meeting is set for 8 p.m. in the city hall here. The hearing is to set boundaries for the new district if sentiment approved of an election. New state conservation committee policies put emphasis on the hearing since to-day a simple majority of any number of ballots cast for or against the district makes a decision. Previously, a certain percentage of land owners within the specified area had to vote before the election was valid.

State committee officials are to be on hand for tonight's hearing.

Commission Sets Bid Call

The State Highway Commission will call bids July 10-11 at Portland on 28 projects costing an estimated \$8,200,000.

One of the projects is for production of 10,000 cubic yards of crushed rock on the McCredie Springs-Willamette Junction section of the Willamette highway, in Klamath and Lane counties.
