### Morse Due To Try Again For Foreign Relations Seat

WASHINGTON (R.-Ore.) — Sen. Wayne Morse, unsuccessful in several tries for a seat on the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, probably is getting ready to make another bid.

Morse won't reveal his plans but the recent primary election defeat of Sen. Brewster of Maine leaves a GOP vacancy on the committee, and Morse is known to want the post.

### Rep. Critical Of Bidding

WASHINGTON (R.-Wis.) — Rep. David (R.-Wis.) related Wednesday how the government's housekeeping agency advertised for bids for some rivets to fix hinges on a post office door instead of simply buying them for a few cents.

This is how it happened, he said in a statement: A few rivets came out of the hinges of a door on the San Angelo, Tex., post office.

The General Services Administration checked hardware stores in San Angelo and Dallas but didn't find the exact rivets it wanted.

So it asked rivet manufacturers as far from Texas as Wisconsin to submit bids.

The cost of issuing the call for bids probably was more than the cost of 48 rivets, he said. "As a matter of fact, GSA didn't need that many rivets, but wanted some spares in case another hinge went bad."

He added that the rivet wanted is the standard use for brake linings "which could have been purchased from any garage or automotive jobber in the U.S. for a few cents."

Davis said Administrator Jess Larson of the agency had advised him "that the item was available from automotive jobbers as far from Texas as Wisconsin to submit bids."

## Senate, House Far Apart On Interior Dept. Funds

WASHINGTON (R.-Ore.) — A difference of \$1,978,900 faced House and Senate conferees on the Interior Department money bill Thursday.

### House Cuts Atom Funds

WASHINGTON (R.-Ore.) — A House Appropriations subcommittee has approved less than half the funds requested for a vast atomic expansion program designed to produce a "complete family" of nuclear weapons.

But Rep. Gore (D-Tenn.), a committee member, told a reporter the \$1,450,000,000 granted would permit the Atomic Energy Commission (AEC) to go ahead with its full program.

Commenting on the \$3,191,000,000 requested for the fiscal year starting July 1, Gore said the AEC frequently has overestimated its costs as much as 100 percent.

He said the committee felt the lesser amount would permit the program to be started and the AEC could come back next January and ask for more money if needed.

Gore said the subcommittee—in actions Tuesday—also approved all of a 150-million-dollar request for the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) to construct steam-electric power plants to support the atomic program.

### Portland Pastor To Go To NYC

PORTLAND (R.-Ore.) — The Rev. Ralph Walker, for the past 11 years minister of the First Baptist Church here, said Wednesday he has accepted the post as pastor of the Madison Avenue Baptist Church in New York City.

### Plywood Merger Turned Down

TACOMA (R.-Ore.) — Proposed merger of the Georgia-Pacific Plywood Co. and the Harbor Plywood Corp., Aberdeen, Wash., was rejected by Harbor Plywood's board of directors Tuesday.

Martin Degeller, Harbor Plywood president, said the directors decided not to accept Georgia-Pacific's offer of cash and stock but gave no reason.

Georgia-Pacific had offered \$6 in cash and one-half share of common stock for each share of Harbor Plywood stock.

It was the third Georgia-Pacific merger proposal turned down by Harbor Plywood.

PORTLAND (R.-Ore.) — Oregon's 12 delegates to the Democratic national convention at Chicago next month will meet in Portland Saturday to select a chairman.

Possible candidates are Joseph Carson Jr., a former Portland mayor who now lives in Washington, D. C., but who maintains a legal residence in Portland, and Multnomah County Sheriff Terry Schunk, who polled the most votes as a delegate candidate in last month's election.

### High Winds In Space

WASHINGTON (R.-Ore.) — Where does the wind blow 1,000 miles an hour? About 100 miles above the earth, the National Geographic Society reported Wednesday, adding this odd bit of information:

If you were up there in the biosphere exposed to those winds you'd find them too weak to blow your hat off.

"The reason," said the society in a report, "is that at such heights there is little atmosphere."

"In consequence, nothing exists that could buffet the human and tell him he faced a flow with a speed of more than 13 times earth's winds of hurricane force."

The report discussed the tracking of these "ghost" winds by radar.

It said Cambridge University scientists found one super-tornado streaking through the skies at 1,100 miles an hour.

notice stipulated that work on the Selma project should not start until it is determined whether the project is to be a unit of the larger Central Valley project.

The fight against the proposed new construction was led by Sen. Douglas (D-Ill.), who offered the amendment to cut 21 million dollars from the reclamation funds.

These additions included: A 6 1/2 million dollar increase in the Indian Bureau fund for construction of schools, roads and other facilities.

Otherwise, the Senate approved all items as reported Monday by its appropriations committee.

By a vote of 69 to 17, proponents of 10 new starts on reclamation projects beat back an attempt to trim 31 million from construction funds for the Reclamation Bureau set by the committee at \$155,496,531.

The new starts which were voted by the Senate, and the amounts approved for each during the next included:

Central Valley, Sly Park Unit, Calif. 1 1/2 million dollars; Estero Monticello Dam, Calif. three million; Minidoka, North Side pump-out, Idaho, \$150,000; Savase Rapids Utah, \$1,350,000; Yakima, Kennewick Division, Wash., 1 1/2 million.

None of these new starts was voted by the House and their ultimate fate will not be known until the conference committee report is made.
