Lattimore Tip Ruled False; Man Indicted

SEATTLE (AP)—A 32-year-old Finn who came to this country 11 years ago after fighting the Russians in his homeland was accused by a federal grand jury Friday of lying about Owen Lattimore. The jury returned two indictments against Harry A. Jarvinen, a Seattle travel agency executive, charging him with giving false and fictitious statements both to the Central Intelligence Agency and the FBI. Jarvinen will be arraigned Monday. He said he will plead innocent. He is free on \$500 bond. His attorney blames "too much drinking" at a cocktail party for Jarvinen's trouble. The false tip given by the travel agency manager was that Lattimore, Johns Hopkins University professor and Far Eastern expert, planned a trip to Russia. As a result, the State Department barred Lattimore's departure from this country. Later the FBI determined the tip was false. Lattimore had denied all along he had no intention of leaving. The university professor, a favorite target of Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) in his accusations of Communist influence in the State Department, also has denied any Communist connections. After the grand jury handed down the indictments, Lattimore said in Baltimore he had never heard of Jarvinen but hoped the investigation would "find out what it's all about." The State Department had no comment. Jarvinen's lawyer, Gerald Shucklin, said his client made a chance remark at a party where he had too much to drink. A CIA agent was present and overheard what was said, passing it along to the State Department. "No one would have been justified in acting on that statement," Shucklin said. Neither Jarvinen nor Shucklin offered any comment on the second indictment, which alleged that Jarvinen repeated the false tip to FBI agents called in to investigate. Jarvinen, who became a U.S. citizen in 1943, fought against the Russians in their 1939 invasion of Finland and served two years in the U.S. Army's 10th Mountain Division before he was discharged for medical reasons. None of the principals in the case, nor the 23-member jury, gave any inkling as to Jarvinen's motive in falsely reporting that Lattimore intended to make a trip back of the Iron Curtain. Jarvinen was accused of telling CIA agents Lattimore's tickets were purchased through his agency, and the professor was to leave New York City June 21 by plane.

Work To Start On New Ship

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Navy announced Saturday that the keel of the 59,900-ton supercarrier Forrestal will be laid on July 14. Defense Secretary Robert Lovett will preside. The keel laying will be at the Newport News Shipbuilding and drydock company in Virginia. The Navy announcement said that the Forrestal, with an overall length of 1,040 feet, "will be the longest warship in the world." It is designed to handle the heavier, faster jet aircraft of the future and, said the announcement, thus enable the Navy to fully exploit the offensive capabilities of naval air power. The Forrestal, with its protective fighter aircraft, anti-aircraft batteries, high maneuverability and resistance to damage by attack together with the protection given by cruisers and destroyers which form the defensive screen "will present one of the most highly defended and elusive targets an enemy could attack," the Navy said. The Navy estimated that the launching should take place in March, 1954. The flight deck of the carrier will be 252 feet wide and will be entirely unobstructed. The navigational bridge will be retractable, lowered out of the way when planes are landing and taking off.

College Dean Dies At 72

SEATTLE (AP)—University of Washington Dean Emeritus, Herbert T. Condon, adviser to the Board of Regents and an official with 49 years of service to the University of Washington, died shortly after midnight Friday. He was 72. He had suffered from a long illness which, for the first time in many years, prevented him from taking his usual traditional place at the head of the June Commencement procession. He became dean of men at the University in 1930 and had served under nine presidents. Previously he was at Oregon Agricultural College, now Oregon State College, and at the University of Idaho. Born on St. Patrick's Day, 1879, at Athol, Ore., he graduated from the University of Oregon and took a law degree at the University of Michigan. He practiced law at Eugene, Ore., for two years and was editor of the Eugene Daily Register two years before becoming registrar and comptroller at Oregon Agricultural College. He went to the University of Idaho for a short time before coming to Washington.

Markets Good For Poultry

CORVALLIS (AP)—Poultrymen were told here Friday that fairly good markets are in prospect for the next six months or so, but the Oregon broiler market has not been good. Earl Gilmore of Springfield, speaking at the Oregon Poultry Improvement Association's annual meeting, said that in the past half-year a number of Western Oregon producers were forced out of the broiler business because it was pretty much on a buyer's market. However, J. E. Parker of Oregon State College pointed out that the broiler industry had made tremendous growth and might reach a value of a billion dollars this year. He said it had outstripped all other segments of the poultry industry in rate of growth. John Kirk St. Paul, was elected president, and Noel Bennion of OSC was re-named secretary-treasurer. New board members: Jake Hoehn of Grants Pass, Marlow Jenks of Tangent and Lloyd Lee of Salem.
