Milly's Mirror

I just finished unpacking a box containing some examples of the craft work of Roy Mallory at the Art Center. My reaction was "Wow! Mallory, you know, will be the crafts teacher at the Art Association's Summer Art Workshop for one month beginning July 7 at the OTI campus."

His workmanship is simply perfect and covers such a wide range that he is able to teach anything in the line of crafts that anyone can mention. There is a superb bowl hand-hammered from pure copper and then a decorated tin casket pan from the dime store which shows the range of choice he has to offer. The pieces of jewelry he sent were so beautiful that I wanted to put them right on and wear them. Alas! they are not for sale. He made them specially for his wife and handed her jewel box because I had especially requested him to send samples of his metal work.

The other different crafts and techniques are so varied that I am unable to mention them all here. They are on display at the Art Center where you can go to see them for yourself. There are many examples of weaving, silk screen printing, block printing, metal work and ceramics. Those who attend the workshop will be able to learn to do the things that most suit their fancy.

We have had many inquiries concerning the printing class. People who do not paint modern have wondered if Mr. Bunce, who incidentally paints very modern, will try to make them paint like he does. It is very simple to say that an artist does not have to paint in any manner, at all unless he chooses to do so. You are doing the painting and the choice lies within you.

A good teacher tries only to teach the fundamentals of good painting such as color harmony, composition, rhythm and balance, to help bring out the particular style and talent of each individual student. The rest is up to you. All you need is the desire to paint and a good teacher to help mould your special style. It may take the direction of the very abstract or the very photographic. Good and bad paintings are produced by either style. A good teacher who can help to teach you good design, color harmony and composition can help you to develop into a good painter.

Each year the Art Association has hired the best teachers available in the country today. They have always been painters and designers, who have had their works purchased by the leading museums in the country as examples of the best work being produced in America today and we feel that their opinions can well be relied upon.
