Sunday was a day of sweet revenge for a flock of peddled players and marooned managers who came back to haunt their old stamping grounds.
Tommy Holmes, fired a month ago as manager of the Boston Braves, faced his former hurlers for the first time in the role of a pinch hitter—and cracked out the hit that snapped a 5-3 tie and drove in the run that gave the Brooklyn Dodgers a 6-5 victory.
Fred Fitzsimmons, fired as manager of the Philadelphia Phillies six years ago to the day—June 30, 1945—took over the reins of the New-York Giants due to Leo Du-

Germany, Reds Boast Of Olympic Strength

LONDON (AP)—Germany and Soviet Russia served notice to the world over this week-end that they intend to gather their quota of honors in Olympic track and field competition at Helsinki in July.
While the U. S. A., which usually dominates track and field competition, was selecting its 1952 squad, Germany was doing likewise in Berlin and the Soviet Union was telling proudly of the accomplishments of its athletes at Kiev.
Germany, which has not competed in summer Olympics since 1936, is somewhat of an unknown quantity. The Soviet Union, which never has taken part in Olympic games, is a strong threat in many events—on paper at least.
Germany produced a sensation at world-record qualifying performance Sunday in the 1,500 meters (metric mile) by the youngster, Werner Lueg, an 8:50 clocking by Helmut Lued in the 3,000 meter steeplechase, and a 195-foot 4-inch heave of the hammer by Karl Borsch.
The Soviet results—always treated skeptically in these parts—included an 8:48.6 clocking in the 3,000-meter steeplechase by Vladimir Kasanzov, who has been the "winter book" favorite in this event.

Ed Urness Clobbered

RICHMOND, Va. (AP)—Roanoke of the Class B Piedmont League got Eddie Urness, bonus pitcher from The Dalles, Ore., Saturday and used him against Richmond Sunday. He lost 6-2, giving up eight hits in three and a third inning.
Urness was signed by the Boston Red Sox and sent by them to Albany of the Class A Eastern League. Albany, deciding he needed a chance to pitch offener than would be likely there, assigned him to Roanoke.

Oregon Duo In Olympics

HAMILTON, Ont. (AP)—Two University of Oregon students will run in the Olympic Games for Canada. They are Jack Hutchins and Doug Clement, both of Vancouver, B.C. The selection committee here named them Saturday. Hutchins will be entered in the 800-meter run and Clement in the 400-meter run and the 1600-meter relay.

Suggs Wins, Sets Record

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Louise Suggs won the 7th annual National Women's Open golf championship Sunday and established a new women's world record for 72 holes.
Her 284 in the four day open at Bala Golf Club was the best four rounds ever posted by a woman golfer. The old record was 288, set by Mrs. Babe Zaharias at Palma Ceia Country Club, Tampa, Fla., last year.
The 28-year-old golfer also broke her own open record of 291 set in 1949 at Landover, Md., when she won her other open crown. Her four round totals were 70-69-70-75 over the par 69 Bala course.
Seven strokes of the Suggs' pace was 18-year-old Marlene Bauer of Sarasota, Fla., and Betty Jameson, San Antonio Tex., pro Marlene was off to a rough start with a first round 83. She came back to register rounds of 70-67-71.

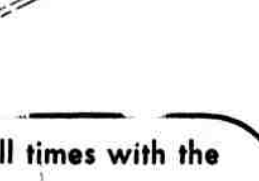

Cincinnati (AP)—Leo Durocher, peppy manager of the New York Giants, may have to sit in the stands for the next few days—but he'll be in full evidence for the major league all-star game July 8.
Durocher, who was handed a four-day suspension by National League chief Warren Giles over the weekend, has the job of directing the ball players the fans think are the best in the senior loop when they tangle with the American League standouts at Philadelphia. Durocher was grounded for acting up in a game Saturday night.
Five of the National Leaguers will be from Lippy, Leo's own Giants, but the Brooklyn Dodgers run off with the "mostest" honors with seven players.
