HOLLYWOOD — (NEA) — Guys and Dolls: Fear of how Hollywood would use her as a grown-up star, Mimi Green confessed, kept her off the screen until this year.

With roles in "Abbott and Costello Lost in Alaska" and "Bloodhounds of Broadway" to her credit now that she's over her jitters about Hollywood, the one-time child star told me:

"I had to break down some illusions about myself. I'd been a child star. And I'd been a star after that—in night clubs and on the stage. I think I saw myself as a Carole Lombard type. Now I know better. I'll be very happy just to get good comedy roles."

"I'm not the 'Did you make a fortune as a child star?' question."

"I made \$400 a week at first. Then \$850. But just when I was ready to hit the big money, \$1250 a week, they let me go. I was too old! I was all of 11 years old."

Keith Andes, the ladies' new heart throb — he plays Marilyn Monroe's boy friend in "Clash by Night" and just about steals the film — has shelved his singing career to manhandle movie dolls.

## Rain Hurts Cherry Crop

Rain washed heavily on Oregon over the week end. The value of the state's cherry crop was cut by thousands of dollars. Some hay and clover was damaged. A roof leak caused substantial damage to the U. S. National Bank at Junction City.

The rainstorm was at its peak in Western Oregon late Saturday but many points were well soaked Sunday.

Eastern Oregon got most of its heavy rain starting at mid-day Sunday. By that time the storm had moved eastward off the coast and clear skies were reported there.

Most cherry growers held off making damage estimates. Field men for the processor groups were checking orchards Monday to determine damage. Estimates ranged to a pessimistic high of 90 per cent in some Hood River orchards. Other orchards in the same vicinity reported estimated loss at under 30 per cent.

A somewhat similar situation was reported in the Salem area, center of the industry, although there was less rain. Percentage estimates. One grower there said he had taken a 19 per cent docking from splitting before the Sunday rain, but that this was his maximum and some trees in the same orchard had only 2 to 4 per cent loss.

The Hood River Valley crop had been expected to be third best in history with a cash value ranging from three quarters of a million to a million dollars.

In Wasco County, E. M. Nelson, county agent, said at the Dalles that about 60 per cent of the crop had been picked before the week end rain. Of the 40 per cent left, it was pretty much all split, he estimated.

## Two Arrested On Drunk Raps

Two persons were arrested by City Police over the weekend on drunk driving charges.

They are, Mildred Scott, 45-year-old waitress, of 830 Oak, and Jose Maestas, 30, a railroad laborer.

Ms. Scott was also charged with driving during revoked period. Her operator's license was revoked after a March 31 drunk driving conviction. She was arrested Saturday night on Klamath near 7th.

Maestas, arrested on S. 6th Saturday night after he stalled his car, lights out, in a traffic lane, was also charged with having no operator's license. A companion, Juan Martinez, 50, was booked for being drunk.

Both were jailed for a court appearance today.

## SF Papers Hike Price

SAN FRANCISCO — Four San Francisco bay area metropolitan newspapers announced a price increase Saturday in single copies, effective July 1, because of increased costs of newsprint and production.

An increase from 7 cents to 10 cents for daily papers, and from 15 to 20 cents for Sunday editions was made by the Chronicle and the Examiner. The Oakland Tribune, afternoon and Sunday, made the same change.

The San Francisco Call-Bulletin, an afternoon paper, said that in San Francisco and adjoining San Mateo and Marin Counties, the present 7-cent copy price would be retained, but outside of those three counties, it will be a dime a copy.

The afternoon San Francisco News said it doesn't plan to change. It sells for 7 cents.

The papers are not changing their monthly subscription rates.

## Queen May Get Pay Increase

LONDON — Parliament was urged Monday to give Queen Elizabeth II a yearly salary of 475,000 pounds, or \$1,236,000 — a raise of \$12,000 compared with the wages of her late father.

A select committee representing all major parties in Parliament also proposed the Queen's 31-year-old husband, the Duke of Edinburgh, be paid 40,000 pounds, or \$112,000 for life. He now receives an annual allowance of 10,000 pounds.

The duke, who is recovering from an attack of jaundice, got another piece of good news, this one from the Royal Navy. It announced his promotion from lieutenant commander to commander.

## Truce Talks To Resume

MUNSAEN, Korea — The tightly deadlocked Korean armistice talks resume Tuesday after a three day recess called by the Allies and protested by the Communists.

The Communists Monday admitted responsibility for an anti-aircraft shell which landed 20 feet from the Panmunjon conference tent a few hours before negotiators met Friday. It caused no damage.

The Reds expressed regret for the "inadvertent incident."

In advance of Tuesday's session there was little hope of any crack in the war prisoner deadlock, now nearly two months old.

## Wreck Hurts Klamath Man

E. V. Zell, 52, of 2038 Melrose, was hospitalized early Saturday night for injuries received in an auto collision at Eldorado and Melrose.

He suffered a head cut and an injured leg, and was released Sunday from Klamath Valley Hospital.

Driver of the second car was Verne Owens, 49, 2037 Fremont, operating a 1949 Buick. Owens was going west on Eldorado and Zell's 1946 Dodge was going north on Melrose when the two vehicles collided in the intersection.

Zell's car was knocked to the parking strip across Melrose and he was thrown out, hitting his head against the curb. The car rolled on back across the street and grazed a telephone pole.

Zell was taken to the hospital by Kaler's ambulance. Neither Owens nor his son and daughter in the car were hurt.

## Miss Universe Is Finn Girl

LONG BEACH, Calif. — A perfect Scandinavian beauty—Finland's blonde Armi Kuusela—rules as Miss Universe Monday.

One of her country's official greeters at next month's Olympic games, 18-year-old Miss Kuusela revealed in her royal reception here after besting beauties from 29 other lands.

The fair, blue-eyed Finn was crowned with a diamond-studded coronet that once graced the heads of three czarinas of Russia. At her coronation ball Sunday night, she received a motion picture contract, a \$2,000 sports car and a \$2,500 wrist watch.

Selected as "The Most Beautiful Girl in the World," Miss Finland is 5 feet 5 inches tall and weighs 110 pounds. It is symmetrically distributed on a figure measuring 34, 22 and 34 inches around bust, waist and hips.

Miss Hawaii, dark-eyed brunette, Elsa Edsman, was a close second.

Miss Greece, Daisy Mavragi, 18, of Crete, was third, with Miss Hong Kong, Judy Dan, 21, fourth, and Miss Germany, Renate Hoy, 21, of Munich was fifth.

All finalists, plus Miss United States, Jackie Loughery, 21, of Brooklyn, also received three-month minimum film contracts for \$1,000 each.

Miss United States was eliminated in the semi-finals, together with the Misses Uruguay, South Africa, Sweden and Mexico.

Other lands represented in the beauty pageant were, Alaska, Australia, Belgium, Canada, Chile, Cuba, Denmark, France, Great Britain, India, Israel, Italy, Japan, Norway, Panama, Peru, Philippines, Puerto Rico, Turkey, and Venezuela.

## 4th Klamath Art Workshop Will Commence July 7th

The fourth Klamath Art Workshop, an annual summer study in creative, expression alternating each year between various art media, will be held this year from July 7 to August 1, with painting, graphics, and crafts receiving the emphasis.

Started in 1949 by a small group of enthusiasts interested in the artistic development — historically, scientifically and progressively — of this mid-high region close to the fringes of the nation's last primitive areas, the workshop immediately gained national attention because of the leading artists who came from the metropolitan centers to instruct here during the season.

In the trio of workshops already given there has been heard such voices of artistic authority as Emmy Zwabruck, internationally known designer for Macy's, Lord and Taylor, Marshall-Field, and director of the Prang Studio of the American Crayon Company; Jamie Edward Peck, director of art at the Cornish School in Seattle and creator of advertising art for Ford Motor Company, General Electric, Westinghouse, and twice winner of Guggenheim fellowships; Hardie Gramatyk, famous America water color artist, author, magazine illustrator and member of the National Academy of Design; and Vern Swanson, recognized California and Oregon painter now in France at the University of Nice and whose water colors and oils have been exhibited by the New York Architectural League and others.

Instruction this year will be by Louis Bunce, who has gained international attention through his one-man showings at the Museum of Modern Art in New York and the Cincinnati Art Museum and through his selection for representation in the Metropolitan Museum's recent "American Painting, 1900" exhibition and the exclusive Whitney Museum annual; and Ry W. Mallory, outstanding Oregon art educator and designer.

Now a major yearly project of the organized Klamath Art Association, the workshop is open to anyone interested. Artists take it for improvement in professional skills, others take it for a vocational or avocational pleasure, and teachers and students take it for fully-approved college credit through arrangements with the General Extension Division of the state system of higher education.

Through a cooperative arrangement with the Oregon Technical Institute the workshop is given full use of the 800-acre campus "with living accommodations for individuals or families, and board as reasonable as the appetite," says Mrs. Lorraine Johnson, association president.

Many letters have arrived, Mrs. Johnson reports, for advice on equipment and clothing needed for a summer session in "the workshop which is artistic — west."
