Brother Ready to Step Into Bob Mathias' Decathlon Shoes

NEW YORK (NEA) — The Dr. Charles M. Mathiases of Tulare, Calif., have more affluence than the Yankees.
They make Casey Stengel's platoon system appear antiquated.
Dr. Mathias, football end and extraordinary at Oklahoma years ago, never urged his strapping sons to be athletes. No frustration there, no gnawing ambition for his boys to take after Pop.
The tall, quiet surgeon had thrilled to the roar of the crowd, but his kids could take it or leave it.
Bob and Jim took it.
Bob Mathias is almost a lead-pipe cinch to become the first man to win the Olympic Games decathlon twice. After that?
"No more after Helsinki," he says emphatically. "Keeping in shape for 10 grueling events is not my idea of living. Anyway, Jim will be ready to take over by 1956."
Jim Mathias, a handsome boy of 18, has all the equipment to scale the heights, 187 pounds of muscular coordination. He is bent on keeping the decathlon lease in the family, to compete in the Olympic Trials at Tulare.
Jim has trained the discus 144 feet, put the shot 43. Bob won in 1946 with the same scores.
The younger Mathias, however, isn't exactly a Rev. Bob Richards in the pole vault or a Harrison Dillard in the hurdles. Nor is he a Bob Mathias in these events. He seldom gets higher than eight feet with the bamboo pole, and drapes himself over the hurdles.
But he's a good student, works hard, and Virgil Jackson says he has all the natural ability in the world to conquer his weak events.
"I don't see how he can miss making the 1956 Olympics," relates the man who coached Bob at Tulare High School.
The Mathiases have four youngsters. Gene is the oldest brother, Robert, as his family calls him, the second son, was born Nov. 17, 1930. Jimmy, the third son, just graduated from high school. Patricia, 15, is the baby.
Since Bob came booming out of the Golden West to pick up all the medals, physical culturists have banded the household for the secret formula for raising stalwarts.
Gene is a rangy six-footer, Bob and Jimmy six-foot-one.
They just sort of grew up naturally, explains Mama Mathias.
But what Bob does to decathlon records isn't natural.
It's murder.

Musial, Rosen In Bat Leads

NEW YORK (AP) — Stan Musial, an old hand at winning batting titles, tops the National League's hit parade for the second straight week while Al Rosen of the Cleveland Indians continues to set the pace in the American League.
Musial, the all-star outfielder of the St. Louis Cardinals, boasted a batting mark of .326 through games of Monday night.
The Card slugger, seeking his sixth championship and third straight, has collected 86 hits in 258 trips to the plate and enjoys a ninepoint lead over Brooklyn's Jackie Robinson.
Rosen, who never has batted 300 in his major league career, is out in front in the American League with a .332 average. Ferris Fain, last year's title winner, is second with a .323 figure.

WIMBLEDON, England — Defending champion Dick Savitt of Orange, N. J., and Seixas of Philadelphia, top-seeded American in Wimbledon Lawn Tennis Championships, eliminated in quarter-finals of men's singles. Savitt beaten by Australia's Mervyn Rose; Seixas ousted by Herbie Flam of Beverly Hills, Calif., only American left in singles.

TULARE, Calif. (AP) — The scramble for three places on the U.S. decathlon team for the Olympic Games gets underway Tuesday night, with Tulare's famed Bob Mathias leading a procession of two dozen or more athletes entered in the two-day grind.
Mathias, now a 21-year-old junior at Stanford, amazed the world when, as a high school kid of 17, he captured the decathlon crown in the 1948 games at London.

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Shantz May Open For AL in All-Star Game

CHICAGO (AP) — An American League lineup with an overall batting average of near .300 and a six-man pitching staff with a total of at least 50 wins will be at manager Casey Stengel's command in the annual classic in Philadelphia.
A poll of the nation's baseball fans determined all starters for the annual classic except the pitchers.
Stengel had full authority to pluck his hurling corps and came

up with Vic Raschi (6-2) and Allie Reynolds (9-4) of his own New York Yankees; Mike Garcia (11-5) and Bob Lemon (6-7) of Cleveland; Reginald "Fats" Paige (5-2) St. Louis' peerless relief hurler, and Bobby Shantz of Philadelphia (13-2), the only lefty.
The mound starter probably will be Shantz since the big game on July 8 will be played in the amazing little hurler's own backyard, Philadelphia's Shibe Park.
At the current batting rate, Stengel will have eight 300 or better hitters to bombard the senior circuit as the Americans try to break a two-game losing streak in the all star series.
