**Russell Eyes Rail Progress**

"We live in a new era of research. Only those that are ahead by research will be ahead at the finish line."

D. J. Russell, president, Southern Pacific Company, impressed this thought upon 800 representatives of 70 railroads, assembled in San Francisco, June 24-26, for the 26th annual meeting of the Mechanical Division of the Operating and Maintenance Department, Association of American Railroads.

The vast amount of present railroad research, most of it unseen by the general public, was described by Russell with the comment that it is not enough. "I would like every railroader to be proud of what has been accomplished, but at the same time not be satisfied," he said.

Discussing subjects of interest to his audience of experts on railroad motive power and cars, Russell mentioned the possibility of improving the air conditioning of trains, easing the ride of freight cars, perfecting the design of box cars, investigating the possible use of containers, speeding cars through freight yards, eliminating bearing failures, further standardizing of equipment and parts, and learning how to get more horsepower out of low-grade fuels.

Russell concluded by saying, "It is only by intensified research that we can hope as a nation, first, to keep ahead of our enemies as a protection to ourselves, and second, to find ways to do things better and easier, thereby releasing people and resources to make this a better country and world in which to live."

**Commons Vote OKs Winnie**

LONDON (AP) — The House of Commons decided Tuesday night it couldn't blame Prime Minister Winston Churchill's government because it hadn't been told the Americans were going to bomb the Yalu River power plants in North Korea.

The House, by a 309-270 vote, defeated a Laborite motion to censure the government because it hadn't been consulted before the raids.

Churchill warned the House that the motion, while technically aimed at his cabinet, "really falls on the United States."

Adoption of the motion could have resulted in the resignation of the government.

**Indian Bureau Study Voted**

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House voted Tuesday to have its Interior Affairs Committee investigate the Indian Bureau.

The probe was ordered in a voice vote taken on a resolution by Rep. Ellsworth (R-Ore.). The resolution said there were irregularities in land transactions by the bureau's employees in Oregon. It ordered the committee to determine whether present laws regulating the bureau's handling of Indian lands are adequate.

The committee will report before the new Congress is sworn in next Jan. 3.

In a separate action, the bureau was directed to determine how Indians will be able to manage their own affairs without government control.

**Elks Picnic In Malin**

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**Draft Call Set At 30,000**

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Army Wednesday called for 30,000 draftees in September. It said it would need 54,000 more men a month for the final three months of the year.

The Army's September call is about the same as it was for the preceding two months.

It called for 29,000 men in August and 31,000 in July.

The projected draft of 54,000 men in October, November and December would be higher than any since March 1951.

In that month—nearly a year and a half ago—30,000 men were drafted, all for the army.

The announced quota for September brings to 1,013,430 the total number of men drafted since Selective Service resumed operation in September 1950.

Of this total, the Army has drafted or called for 932,000.

The Marine Corps received 81,430 draftees during the 10 months ending last May in which it supplemented volunteer enlistments with selective service inductions.

The Marine Corps announced several months ago that it did not plan to resume the use of the draft. The Navy and Air Force have depended solely on volunteers.

The defense Department said the projected increase in inductions during the last three months of this year, is necessary to replace men drafted in the latter part of 1950 and the early months of 1951.

Men who entered the service at that time will be eligible for separation by the end of the current year.

**Casualties Show Increase**

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Defense Department Wednesday reported the biggest weekly increase in U.S. casualties in the Korean war since last Nov. 14.

The department listed 965 casualties in the week ended last Friday.

The casualty increase for the week that ended Nov. 14, 1951, totaled 1,712 Americans.

Most of the American casualties last week were in the Army, which listed 799 persons killed, wounded or missing in Korean fighting.

There were 151 Marine victims, 11 from the Navy and four from the Air Force, bringing total U.S. casualties in the fighting to 111,576.

Yesterday, Mrs. Weatherly drove away from the service station with the dog in the car. When she stopped at Shasta Way and South Sixth Streets, she noticed the dog missing from the car.

Anyone with information about the dog should phone 9195 during the daytime or 7923 in the evening.

**Firms Close For Fourth**

The Fourth of July will be a holiday for a big majority of the workers in this area and for many it will afford a three-day weekend.

Most business houses will close on the Fourth and city, county and federal offices will also be closed the following day, Saturday. The state liquor store will be closed both days.

Most of the larger grocery stores will be closed the Fourth. Remaining open will be the Big Y and two Emul's stores, the ones on South Sixth and Oregon Avenue.

Two garages are to remain open, according to Garage Association Pres. Jim Olson. They are Balzinger's and Ashley Chevrolet.

The Herald and News will publish Friday, the Fourth, but will not run the presses on Saturday.

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
