ACORNS CLIMB TO TOP

The Oakland Acorns, hot contenders all season, have finally fought their way to first place in the Pacific Coast League.

Mel Ott's hustling ball club, five games off the pace before the Acorns last week with front runner Hollywood, won seven out of eight and wound up a game ahead of the Stars.

The Oaks' double win Sunday, 6-3 and 3-2, shoved Hollywood back into a second place tie with San Diego.

At Portland, where veteran outfielder Clint Conaster announced his retirement from baseball, the Beavers split with San Diego. Portland won the opener, 5-2, then succumbed 9-4 in the 10th inning nightcap. The teams split the series, four games to four.

Dain Clay scored the winning run in the second game when Eddie Barr dropped Jack Graham's fly to right field. Clay came all the way from second base. A three-run fourth inning highlighted the Beaver attack in the first game. Hank Arft doubled home a pair, then scored on Eddie Basinski's single. Seattle took both ends of its doubleheader with Sacramento winning the opener 3-1 and the nightcap 4-1. Clarence Madern's double scoring, Walt Judnich broke up the second game. The Rainiers sewed up the opener in the sixth, with three runs on five hits.

Los Angeles simply overpowered San Francisco for a double win, 4-1 and 2-1. The Angels took the series six games to two and cut their distance from the front to six games. They were 10 back a week ago.

Wolfe-Turner Rematch Signed

Title Go Shows On Saturday

Keed Puts Crown Up Tonight

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Steaming heat may put the premium on stamina Monday night in the welterweight title bout between Champion Kid Gavilan of Hawaii and Gil Turner, the 21-year-old challenger from Philadelphia.

Will the 26-year-old Keed from the Cuban canebrakes will under the fury of Gil's swarming attack? Can Turner carry his pace over the 15-round route against Gavilan, the indestructible man?

These are the questions to be answered in the vast municipal stadium where 40,000 fans are expected to pay \$300,000 to see the latest home town sensation bid for a world's title at 7 p.m. (PDT).

With prospects of hot, muggy weather and daytime temperature around 95, this could build up into another Sugar Ray Robinson-Joe Maxim duel of survival.

However, there will be no glaring television lights at ringside because radio, TV and theater TV all have been barred.

Unbeaten Turner, with 25 knockouts in 31 straight wins, brings a sensational record into the ring. But he must face an experienced veteran of 98 fights who has been knocked down only once in his 10-year pro career. Gavilan's record of 22-12-4 lacks the glamor of Turner's perfection but it reflects the keed's willingness to fight 'em all.

All-Star Hurlers Mauled

It looks as though the pitchers are in for a tough time in the major league's 15th all star game at Philadelphia Tuesday.

Five of the 12 pitchers on the dream squads saw action Sunday in the final games before the mid-summer classic — and all were beaten. The sluggers, on the other hand, came through with flying colors.

The American League suffered the biggest blow when Bobby Shantz, the tiny lefthander of the Philadelphia Athletics, was forced to retire after four innings because of a muscle pain across his chest in the first game of a doubleheader against the pace-setting New York Yankees.

Shantz, the major's top winner with 14, was counted on to start against the National but it appears now that Cleveland's Bob Lemon may draw the assignment.

The Yanks clipped Shantz for four runs during his stay and went on to defeat the A's, 5 - 2. All Stars, Gil McDougald and Mickey Mantle led the Yank drive against Shantz, each smacking a homer.

Philadelphia bounced back to win the second game, 7-6. The split enabled the Yanks to retain their three game lead.

The Chicago White Sox took over second place from Cleveland, edging the Indians, 2, in 13-innings on all-star Minnie Miñoso's homer.

The four-place Chicago Cubs took two from Cincinnati, 5 - 1 and 2 - 0, behind Paul Minner's two hitter and Warren Hacker's four - hitter.

Brooklyn opened a 4 1/2 - game lead in the National League, trouncing the Boston Braves, 5-2, while the second - place New York Giants divided with Philadelphia, 4-3 and 3-2.

The scrapping, curly - haired favorite of Michigan fans had been a relief pitcher this season under manager Red Rolfe, who was fired at 6 p. m. Saturday. Hutch never had a losing record in six previous seasons as a starter.

Hutchinson's appointment came as a complete surprise. Hutch himself didn't even know he was being considered until President Spike Briggs phoned him Saturday afternoon.

Hutch May Quit Mound

DETROIT (AP) — Fred Hutchinson waited only 20 hours after taking over as Detroit Tiger manager to say that he may shelve all pitching duties and concentrate on guiding his team out of last place.

The 32-year-old righthander, who hurled in last year's all star game, said he didn't plan to give himself any starting assignments in the near future.

And he said he didn't plan to put himself in the bullpen with the other relief hurlers. "Can't be out there and manager" were his words.

The Klamath Cokes need a split with Medford next Sunday in a Gems Stadium doubleheader to tie down an American Junior League berth in the Southern Oregon District playoffs in North Bend — a new site named recently—July 25-27.

The Cokes walloped Lakeview twice yesterday, 17-0 and 30-2, in two scheduled five-inning games at Gems Stadium, the second stopped in the fourth inning.

Lakeview picked up its bats and went home in the fourth frame of the afterpiece when the Cokes had a nine-run rally going with none out.

Lakeview promptly announced it was forfeiting its remaining two games with Medford.

The two wins gave the Cokes an unbeaten (6-0) record in League 4 play while Medford, with the two forfeit victories, holds a 4-2 record.

A split would give John McGinnis' Cokes the title. If Medford wins both to knot the standings, then the first game of a scheduled doubleheader July 20 here would be counted as a playoff game.

Regardless of the result of next Sunday's twin bill, Medford will visit Klamath Falls July 20. David D'Oliveo and Elvis Mitchell pitched yesterday's games for the Cokes, each giving up just one hit.

340 Games Athletes Begin Trek

NEW YORK (AP) — The United States Olympic team — some 340 athletes — begins its trek to Helsinki Monday.

The first group, comprising mostly officials along with the soccer and basketball teams, leaves by plane for the big games, scheduled to run from July 19 to Aug. 4.

Two more plane loads, including the top track squad that's expected to clean up in Europe, is scheduled to leave Monday, while another group will leave Wednesday and a third batch Thursday.

The water polo and swimming teams, the last selected — the swimming tryouts ended only Sunday — appropriately will be the last to go.

Olympic Swim Mark Broken

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — The 1952 U. S. women's Olympic swimming team could set a new Olympic record in the 400 - meter relay and it's the strongest it has ever been in the 200 - meter breaststroke.

The 19 - girl team selected in tryouts at Broad Ripple pool over the week end cracked two American records in the battle of teenagers with Olympic veterans.

Judy Cornell, swimming for the Portland Junior Chamber of Commerce, and Della Sehorn of the Columbia A. C., Portland, were right behind Gail Peters of Washington at the finish of the 200 meter breast stroke.
