Fireball Seen In East Ore.

BOISE, Idaho (AP) — A "ball of fire" was sighted streaking across the sky in Eastern Oregon, Southwestern Idaho and Eastern Washington Monday.

There was no immediate explanation, but aviation officials said the sighting of it over such a wide area indicated it was not an airplane crash.

An Empire Airlines pilot reported seeing the "ball" over Pendleton, Ore. Other unconfirmed reports had it sighted at Baker, Ore. Several Boiseans called police with reports of it, and State Police man Dean Bennett sighted it as he drove between Boise and Mountain Home.

The CAA control tower at Gowen Field said most reports had the "ball" going across the sky north of Boise between 10:30 and 10:35 a. m. Estimates of its height varied from 1,500 to 20,000 feet. There was no agreement on which direction it was traveling.

Bennett said the "ball" appeared to smash in the mountains north of Mountain Home. The Elmore County sheriff's office at Mountain Home, east of Boise, said it had received no reports on it.

Train Wreck Derails 57

WAMSUTTER, Wyo. (AP) — Fifty-seven freight cars were derailed and a coal chute knocked down in the wreck here Sunday night of the Union Pacific freight train.

The accident tied up traffic for several hours since the wreckage blocked the double track main line. A "shoo-fly" track was laid around the wreckage Monday morning.

Forty-seven cars on westbound extra freight No. 4011 and ten on eastbound extra freight No. 3746 were derailed in the wreck.

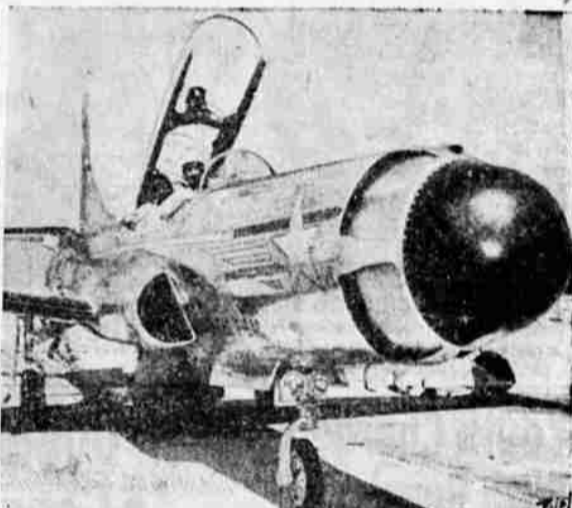
Robert P. Dixon of Rawlins, head brakeman on the eastbound freight, was hospitalized at Rawlins with a back injury. Doctors said his condition was not serious.

The wreck occurred just as the westbound train was passing the Wamsutter station.

The head car in the train, an oil car, jumped the track and struck a column of the 40-foot high coal chute west of the station, knocking part of the chute down. Forty-six cars behind the oil car were derailed and piled up across the double track line.

The eastbound train was unable to stop in time to avoid crashing into the derailed cars from the westbound train. The locomotive and 10 cars on this train were knocked off the track in the resulting collision.

Unofficial reports said a journal box on the oil car on the westbound train apparently broke and caused the derailment.

Tacoma Paper Fails To Print

TACOMA (AP) — The Tacoma News Tribune, shut down for nearly three months in a pressmen's dispute, failed to publish Monday despite management predictions that it would do so.

Non-striking employees of the Tribune Publishing Co. had been asked in letters last week to return to work Monday.

Publisher Frank S. Baker said mechanical crews did not report for work.

Non-striking, non-mechanical members of the staff — except members of the American Newspaper Guild — reported for work in response to management's earlier invitation, Baker said.

"We were prepared to resume publication had the mechanical crews reported," Baker said.

"All we can consider now is that the other mechanical departments are in concert with the pressmen. It's apparent to us now that other mechanical crafts are just as much responsible for non-publication as are the pressmen."

The pressmen struck for higher wages and other benefits April 12.

V. T. Evans, president of the Tacoma Typographical Union, said the mechanical workmen did not consider the management invitation to return to work a valid one.

"The management's letter was not addressed to the proper persons," Evans said. "The letter was sent to the scale chairman. It did not in itself contain a legitimate offer of work."

Chaney Says Horror Shows Will Stage Movie Return

HOLLYWOOD (NEA) — Behind the Screen: The monster's about to grab the goose-pimples heroine again and carry her out on the lonely moor, while the studio "moonlight" shines through her nightgown and movie audiences choke on their popcorn.

That's the prediction of Lon Chaney, Jr., who hit stardom as a horror man in the Dracula, Frankenstein and Wolfman series.

Lon, currently menacing Gory Cooper in "Springfield Rifle," says that "screamer" features will bring stay-at-home rushing back to the box office and adds:

"Horror is as ripe as Hades in Hollywood right now. All the studios, particularly U.I., are beginning to realize it. Hollywood killed the horror picture cycle that my dad started. He was a sympathetic horror man and there was always a reason for it.

"Producers started to put too much horror into movies. The PTAs and religious groups protested and producers stopped making them. Now we're going to start again—this time with some taste and discipline."

They're writing "Jean Simmons and Bob Mitchell Get Along" on the walls at RKO. Jean and Bob co-star in "The Murderer" when they finish "Beautiful, But Dangerous," but crew members still remember how Bob and Susan Hayward tangled during production of "The Lusty Men."

I asked Bob about it and got this: "Maybe Susan didn't like me, but I liked her."

There are heavy acting scripts from tales by Theodore Dreiser, F. Scott Fitzgerald and Henry James being offered Alan Ladd, but he's turning them down with a "No, thanks."

It seems that the boys who guessed that Alan was out to prove he was in the Lawrence Olivier class when he left Paramount were wrong.

Mr. Box Office isn't giving up the Ladd style.

"I don't want to convince anybody that I'm the world's greatest actor," Alan shrugged on "The Iron Mistress" set. "It's too late for that anyhow. I left Paramount because I wanted important stories. I just want to entertain people."

He goes to London for "Red Beret" when he completes "Desert Legion" for U.I., then returns to Hollywood for two more films at Paramount, five for Warners and one additional U.I. flicker.

The contract between Judy Canova and Republic is the first in Hollywood history to give a star the right to devote most of her time to TV and make movies when she's free.

It's in the fine print of her contract and may cut down her movie making to one a year after she completes "The Hot Heiress" in London this summer.
