

Nationals Win on Homers

Hot Words Fly After Abbreviated 3-2 Win

One Fight Judge Named

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — The triumphant National League All-Stars should have been happy Wednesday with their third straight victory over the American League.

Instead, they were bitter—and all their bitterness was directed at their beaten rivals.

"So Casey Stengel blames their defeat on the weather?" a National League all-star participant echoed. "That's a lot of sour grapes. What's the matter? Don't they like it when the shoe is on the other foot?"

"I suppose the raindrops carried

the wall," the indignant National Leaguer continued. "If anybody has a beef about the rain, it should be us. They would not have scored either of their two runs if the ground had not been wet and slippery."

Earlier manager Stengel was asked to what he attributed the American 3-2 defeat in Tuesday's game that was cut to five innings because of incessant rain.

"I ain't blaming anybody," the smarted old skipper of the New York Yankees said at first. Then he ventured, "maybe the rain."

There is no question but what the rain and muggy field marred the play, but it didn't appear to hamper the pitchers and it had little effect, if any, on the National League slugger.

Neither rain, nor snow, nor sleet would have prevented Sauer's terrific blast from clearing the wall with Stan Musial on base in the fourth inning.

That muggy home run, a 430-footer that landed atop the roof and bounced out of the premises, equalized the two splurge of the American in the top of the fourth and gave the Nationals their seventh win in 12 clashes and manager Leo Durocher's first in three attempts.

Coming on top of the robust four-banger belted by Jackie Robinson in the first inning, Sauer's blow proved for the third consecutive year that the balance of power has definitely swung towards the older circuit.

Torrid Yakima Drubs Tyees, Move to Sixth

The Yakima Bears continued their drive toward the Western International League's first division Tuesday night, moving into sixth place after an 18-3 thrashing handed Victoria.

It was the 12th win in 13 games for the Bears, who vacated the league cellar only last Sunday, and their second straight over the league leaders.

LEADS ASSAULT — Pitcher-outfielder John Albini led the Yakima assault with a home run, two doubles, a single and a walk in six trips. Phil Steinberg connected for a triple, a double and two singles and manager Dario Lodigiani and Mike Donahue had three hits apiece.

Yakima's heavy hitters were topped, however, by Vancouver's Caplanos who banged out 20 hits in smothering last-place Wenatchee 19-5.

The Caps' assault included a

triple and five doubles. They scored nine of their runs in the first two innings. The win evened the series at a game apiece.

SKID — Lewiston meanwhile regained fourth place with a 7-5 victory over the Salem Senators who skidded to seventh place behind the Bears. Four Salem hurlers yielded 12 hits to the Bronchos.

Keith Bowman went the distance for Lewiston allowing 11 hits including four by shortstop Gene Tansell.

At Kennewick, Spokane first-sacker Ed Bouchie homered twice to give the Indians their edge in a 7-5 win over Tri-City. They were aided by a pair of Tri-City errors and wild pitching by Bob Greenwood in the seventh when Spokane shoved in three unearned runs.

Vanderveer, Weiser Sign For Rematch

Champion Dick Wolfe and Challenger Earl Turner were expected to pitch camp here tomorrow for their 12-round championship bout Saturday night at the Armory in the most discussed fight here in a decade as Promoter Mack Lillard named one judge and closed an outstanding semi-win.

Northwest Middleweight Champion Wolfe, who also holds the welterweight title, defends his middle crown just three weeks after winning it from the Earl of Richmond in a furious bout here June 20.

It's seldom officials of a fight have held the spotlight as they will in this title match, the first 12-rounder in Southern Oregon fight history.

Picking of officials—referee and two judges—became a prime issue in the wake of the unpopular decision June 20 that made Wolfe a double titleholder.

So amazing was the verdict that gave Wolfe a split decision that Harry Eagles, Wolfe's acting manager, claimed "my boy didn't win."

Matchmaker Mack Lillard closed the bout over the weekend with a stipulation from both principals—made all the more emphatic by howls of local fans—that there be a complete remodeling of the official staff.

Lillard obtained the services of Referee Earl Yorkley early this week and yesterday said that Bob Ross Sr., Klamath Falls mechanic and ex-lighter, had agreed to take one of the judging jobs.

The Boxing Commission is expected to name the other judge today or tomorrow.

REMATCH — Meantime, the preliminary card was shaping up as Lillard landed a bout the fans have been asking for since its first showing. It puts Ralph Weiser, the Beatty Bomber, against Blackie Vanderveer, classy cocky Seattle lightweight.

Since thrashing Weiser, Vanderveer has appeared here again to stop Monty Montgomery. Weiser has been screaming for a rematch. This fight will show in the semi-windup spot over a six-round distance.

The Bruce Miller-Kid Pollard special event was lost when Miller notified Lillard he would be unable to go on this card.

But Lillard is looking for an opponent for Jerry Renaud, popular Portland welterweight, signed yesterday. The special event will also be billed for six rounds.

Two four-rounders will complete the card.

Three more, 5th and Main, have reserved tickets that can be purchased at the store or laid aside by calling 6621.



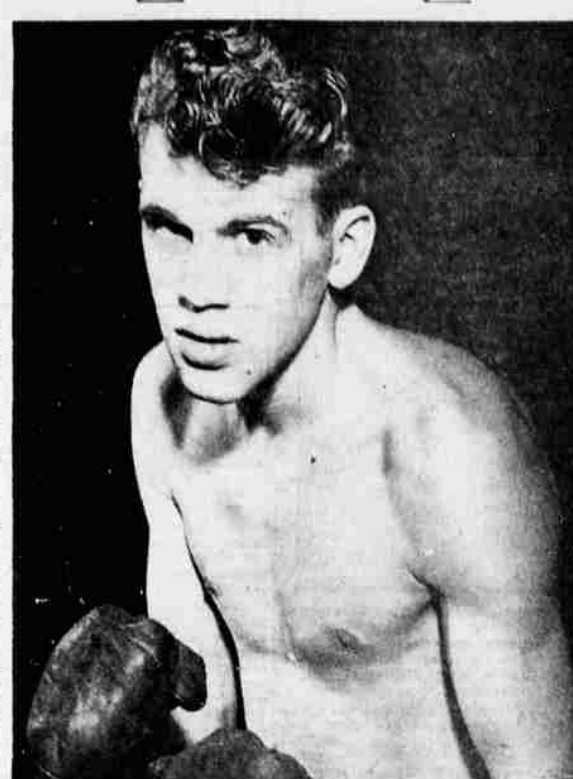

Burke Ahead in Golf Cash-Winning Circuit

CHICAGO (AP) — Professional golfer's race for 1952 money-winning honors is beginning to get hot. Jack Burke, once well-entrenched as the cash-collecting leader, now heads 1951 money king, Lloyd Mangrum, by less than \$700, and Cary Middlecoff is pushing in the third spot.

Burke has \$12,970, Mangrum \$12,296, and Middlecoff \$11,106, the PGA reported Wednesday.

What's more, three players are bunched in the \$9,000 bracket, including Dave Douglas, Julius Boros and Ted Kroll.

Burke, who zoomed to a good cash lead with four straight wins earlier in the year, has been displaced by Mangrum as leader in the Vardon Trophy race.

Mangrum's average for 40 rounds is 70.70, compared with Burke's 70.54. Kroll and Jim Ferrier are tied for third with 71.20.

Burke still holds a 40-point lead over Mangrum in the Ryder Cup team contention, 363 1/2 to 314 1/2.
