Upsets Mark Women's Play in Tacoma Meet

Medalist Honors Go To Givan

TACOMA (U.P.)—Upsets marked the first day of match play for the women in the Pacific Northwest Golf Association tournament Tuesday but steady Harry Givan of Seattle rode a red-hot putter to medalist honors in the men's division.

Connie Oldershaw of Spokane and Mrs. J. C. Heron of Portland were the unexpected losers as the feminine contingent battled each other and a tricky breeze at the Fircrest course.

Mrs. Mike Banks of Seattle put young Miss Oldershaw out of the running in a match that never found the two separated by more than one hole. They were all even going into 18, the Seattle contestant closing it out with a steady par four while Connie was playing through the rough to the green for a conceded five.

Two down to Mary Rupp of Seattle, Mrs. Heron birdied the 17th hole to halve the margin, but both fired pars on 18 to leave the Portland veteran one down.

The favorite and defending champion, Edean Anderson of Helena, Mont., romped to a 5 and 4 triumph over Mrs. L. Von Reichbauer of Tacoma after turning the first nine all even.

Givan, scoring his second straight 69 to mash par by six strokes for the two qualifying rounds, needed only 28 putts for his Tuesday tour. He hit only two traps and got out comfortably, and he and the rough were strangers.

He went over par on only one hole and had four birdies.

Only one other player, Dick Yost of Portland, was able to get around in par figures. Dick led the Monday parade with a 68 but slipped to 76 Wednesday to wind up second with 144—even par.

Bruce Cudd, also of Portland, was alone in third place with 146.

STIFF WIND
The combination of a wind that made the course play long and greens that were lightning fast kept par safe from assault. Two Seattle players, state champion Eddie Draper and Warren Campbell, plus Bob Atkinson of Portland, gave the Tacoma Country and Golf Club course a tussle.

Draper carding a 71 and the others par 72.

Thirty-one men with scores of 154 or better qualified for the four days of match play starting Wednesday. The 32nd position was a wrangle among nine who finished with 155. All these were due to tee off together at 8:30 a. m. Wednesday in a sudden-death battle for the berth.

Players who failed to make the championship flight continue in the tourney, playing in lower flights.

Sarazen's Clubs Stay Warm In British Open Golf Meet

STANNES-ON-SEA, England (U.P.)—Britain's Open Golf championship began in earnest on the 6,637-yard Royal Lytham course Wednesday with the veteran Gene Sarazen, winner of the title 20 years ago, one of the big favorites.

There are 92 entrants still in the running and after two more rounds the field will be cut to 50. Three former champions failed to survive the qualifying rounds for Britain's top golfing honor—Dick Burton, Alf Padgham and Reg Whitecombe, all Britons.

But stocky Sarazen from Germantown, N. Y., showed he still is capable of brilliant golf. The 50-year-old farmer shot 69's both Tuesday and Monday to finish sixth in the list of qualifiers.

Other Americans who are out for a crack at the title included Willis Hunter of Los Angeles who had a 146, Willie Goggin of Montclair, N. J., with a 148, Jimmy Hines of Chicago with a 149 and Frank

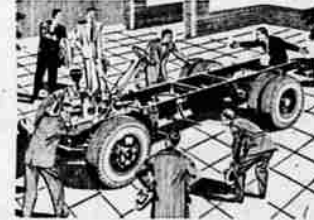

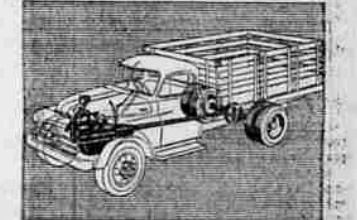
