Living Costs Record High

WASHINGTON (AP) — The cost of living probably is at an all-time high. And it could go higher.

This was indicated by a series of government reports Monday which said:

1. Food prices went up three-tenths of one per cent in June—to a point 14 per cent higher than just before the Korean War—mainly because of grocery and meat price increases.

2. The next overall cost-of-living index due in about three weeks is expected to show another climb because rents are rising. The last index on May 15 was only one-tenth of a point below the record.

3. Wholesale prices were unchanged for the week ended July 1, indicating the decline during the past few weeks is leveling off.

A staff report to the Senate-Economic Committee the day before said prices may climb to an all-time peak in the next six to 12 months—up one to three per cent—due to increases in rents and services, a recovery in clothing prices, and a slight upturn in consumer durable goods.

The report said food prices would not change much unless crop prospects were altered.

However, the Bureau of Labor Statistics, after making a special food survey of eight key cities on June 15, said Monday food prices are climbing already.

Since food represents about a third of the total spending of the average city family, the rise is believed to have helped push cost of living to or beyond last winter's record.

The food price index on June 15 was 231.6, using the 1935-39 average as 100.

The cost-of-living index on May 15 stood at 189, one-tenth of a point below the 189.1 reached in December and January. The BLS said the next index is due in about three weeks, and is expected to climb because rents, a big item, are rising.

Money Cuts Cause Firings

WASHINGTON (AP) — Thousands of government workers throughout the country are being fired as a result of sharp cuts the 82nd Congress made in appropriations for federal agencies.

Although virtually all departments feel the pinch, hardest hit are the six economic stabilization agencies which officials estimate will release more than 9,000—or over 50 per cent—of their 17,000 employees within 30 days.

These agencies are the Economic Stabilization Agency (ESA), Office of Price Stabilization (OPS), Wage Stabilization Board (WSB), Office of Rent Stabilization, Salary Stabilization Board, and Railroad and Airline Wage Board.

Operating on \$99,658,375 during the fiscal year which closed June 30, Congress cut their funds to 60 millions for the fiscal year which began July 1.

Other government departments, their funds not cut as sharply, are not expected to trim personnel as drastically.

State Department officials, for example, figure they would have to eliminate about 400 jobs here and another 20 in the American mission to the United Nations. They estimated cuts could be made by not filling jobs vacated through normal turnover of personnel, and plan no immediate firings.

The State Department was granted 76 million dollars for fiscal 1953, a cut of \$2,200,000 from last year and \$4,250,000 below the sum requested.

There were no immediate reports from other government agencies on planned cutbacks, but the total will run into additional thousands, officials predict.

The economic agencies, set up to control wages, prices, rents and other economic factors, as of June 30 had a total of 17,069 employees. They included: OPS, 12,319; rent stabilization, 2,900; wage board, 1,600; salary board, 380; ESA, 66; rail and airline wage board, 14.
