**Cannery Ship Said Aground**

KODIAK, Alaska (AP)—The cannery ship SRP, of Seattle, a 150-foot converted landing craft, Wednesday was reported aground at the mouth of the Kalliahk River in Southeastern Alaska.

The Coast Guard said high winds and heavy surf are pounding the vessel and there is danger of it breaking up. However, the six men and one woman aboard when it grounded Sunday are safely ashore awaiting evacuation when the weather subsides.

The vessel is owned by Paul Stout, Edmonds, Wash., and Richard Speidel and Irv Troyer, Seattle.

Mrs. Troyer and Stout's daughter reportedly made the trip north from Seattle. However, the latter was supposed to have left the vessel before it reached the Kalliahk River vicinity.

The Coast Guard said the seven are marooned on a beach about 10 miles west of Yakutat. Coast Guard planes are keeping them supplied with food, and the cutter Kimball is standing by to attempt an evacuation when the winds and surf subside.

**Marriage Rate Down**

WASHINGTON (AP)—The American mating call was muted last year. Marriages were away down. So were divorces.

The Public Health Service said Tuesday the 1951 marriage rate apparently dipped to the lowest point since 1938—1,594,900 marriages, 10.4 per thousand population, and a reduction of 72,300 from 1950.

The 1951 total is 37 per cent below the record set in 1948. There were an estimated 371,000 divorces in 1951—2.4 per every 1,000 persons—compared with 385,100 in 1950.

**New Mobile Phone System Installed**

ROSEBURG (AP)—A new telephone transmitter and receiver station went into operation here Tuesday, extending the mobile telephone system in Oregon as far south as Glendale, 60 miles south of Roseburg.

The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Co. said 59 customers in this area look on the service. There are other applicants for the auto-mobile-telephone system, but they must wait on installation of more equipment, the company said. Other transmitter stations are at Portland and Salem.
