Blaise Rites Held Today

Funeral services for Harry Patrick Blaise, 65, resident of Oregon since 1912 were held this afternoon from Ward's Chapel with officers of Klamath Lodge, No. 1247, BPOE officiating. Mr. Blaise died at the family home on the Lakeview highway, July 7. He had been in ill health for some time.

He was born in Oswego, N.Y., Feb. 23, 1887, came west to San Francisco and in 1912 to Oregon, working for the Southern Pacific. He started his railroad career in 1909 with the New York Central. For 25 years he was employed on the Spokane, Portland and Seattle railroad as trainmaster and yard master at Portland.

He was a member of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen for 45 years and of the Elks Lodge, No. 142, Portland, for 20 years. Surviving are his widow, Sybil Elliott Blaise, Klamath Falls; one daughter, Mrs. Carmen Emberg, Klamath Falls; two sisters, Mrs. Margaret Anthony, Oswego, N.Y., and Mrs. Florence Young, North East, Penn.; also one brother, Charles A. Blaise, Rochester, N.Y. Concluding services and interment in Klamath Memorial Park.
