### Casualties Top 112,000

WASHINGTON (AP) — Announced U.S. battle casualties in Korea reached 112,128 Wednesday an increase of 532 since last week. The Defense Department's weekly summary based on notifications to families through last Friday reported these new totals. Killed in action 17,651, wounded 81,906, missing 12,571.

### Mishap Kills Railroader

TACOMA (AP) — A Northern Pacific Railway conductor was killed in a railway accident near Bellingham late Tuesday night, the NP dispatcher's office here reported early Wednesday.  
The dispatcher said the conductor, identified as F. W. Sanipoon of Auburn, was in a caboose in the rear of a Northern Pacific train rained by a northbound Great Northern train.  
The accident occurred about two miles south of Bellingham.  
The conductor apparently was crushed as the Great Northern engine rammed the caboose from the rear.  
The G.N. engine was derailed, blocking both lines of the main Tacoma-Portland route. One G.N. and several N.P. freight cars were damaged.  
Rail officials said there would be only slight interference with passenger train schedules. Service is being rerouted over the old prairie route.  
The accident was near the spot where two freight trains collided several weeks ago and strewn wrecked cars over the double-track route.

### NLRB Opens Hearings

PORTLAND (AP) — A National Labor Relations Board hearing on whether the AFL Brotherhood of Electrical Workers should have jurisdiction over 1,500 employes of Northwest Line Constructors Association, opened here Tuesday.  
The workers are those who build transmission lines and substations.  
The electrical workers' union locals at Portland, Medford, Seattle and Tacoma claim jurisdiction. Opposing this are the operating engineers, teamsters, carpenters, hod carriers, and building and construction laborers' union.  
Robert J. Wiener is the NLRB examiner, who will make his recommendation at the close of the hearing.

### Newsmen Pass Resolutions

PORTLAND (AP) — A number of resolutions — including one which calls for a newspaper ban against the word "Jap" — were to go before delegates of the 19th annual American Newspaper Guild convention here Wednesday.  
Other resolutions proposed at Tuesday's session, call for moving

Guild headquarters from New York to Denver and construction of a Heywood Brown Memorial building to house the Guild's national offices.  
A civil rights resolution was offered by William J. Farson, Guild secretary-treasurer. It called for a halt to prosecutions "for speech or advocacy as contrasted with overt acts."  
Ronald Reagan, actor and president of the AFL Screen Actors Guild, was principal speaker at Tuesday night's banquet session. He asked the AVG to join his organization in a fight to preserve

free speech and expression.  
Earlier two warring factions within the Guild declared a truce. Edward Easton Jr., of New York was elected to head a committee

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### Firm Awarded Rain Contract

ARLINGTON, Ore. (AP) — The North American Weather Consultants of Pasadena, Calif., are to be hired to seed clouds for Eastern Oregon wheat farmers, a switch from the Krick seeders.  
Fritz Watkins of Wasco, president of Tri-County Weather Research, Inc., said the group had decided not to renew its contract with Dr. Irving Krick's Water Resources Development Corp. of Denver.  
The California firm, which is to seed clouds for one year beginning Sept. 1, is to be paid on the basis of a formula which takes into consideration rainfall in the area, Watkins said.

### No More TV For Portland

PORTLAND (AP) — Portlanders, getting a look at closed-circuit television, during the Republican convention, and having some reaction from KING-TV, Seattle, will likely get no Portland-cast programs for another year.  
H. Quentin Cox, head of KGW, told the Kiwanis Club Tuesday that before Portland can have stations to take advantage of the TV channels allocated here, there will need to be hearings to determine which applicants are to be approved, then time will be required for construction.  
Don Whitman, program director for KGW, said the people should insist that congressional hearings be open to TV and radio in order that the people may be well informed.



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
