Rain Makers Claim Success

DENVER (AP)—The Water Resources Development Corp. today said its cloud seeding operations in Washington last month were successful but denied it could have caused heavy rains in the fruit growing areas after June 20.

The rain-makers said a preliminary check of weather stations showed rainfall at Mansfield, Wash., was 110 per cent of normal while the fall at Kohlotus was 209 per cent of normal. They claimed increases at Prosser, Waterville and Lind ranging from 139 to 294 per cent of the norm.

"All our projects showed a satisfactory increase for June," said Dr. Irving P. Krick, president of the Denver firm.

"On the basis of rainfall figures it looks like an increase was produced in Yakima, Wenatchee, Ellensburg and Sunnyside, where reports indicate another meteorologist was hired to suppress rain.

"We could have had nothing to do with these rains in the fruit areas which all came after June 20, because... we shut down operations on June 20 and since that time have made a careful check of all operations and find none of them could have contributed to any rainfall in the fruit growing areas."

Krick said his firm had been aware of the critical problem of rain in the fruit areas and with the cooperation of the wheat growers had taken all possible steps to prevent the effect of his cloud seeding operations in the fruit regions.

Publisher Predicts Ike

CHICAGO (AP)—John S. Knight, editor and publisher of the Chicago Daily News, predicted in a page one signed story Wednesday that Dwight D. Eisenhower will be the next Republican nominee for president, with 39-year-old Sen. Richard Nixon of California as his probable running mate.

Sen. Henry Cabot Lodge Jr., of Massachusetts, Eisenhower campaign manager issued a statement saying there has been no discussion of a vice presidential candidate at Eisenhower headquarters.

He did not indicate whether his statement was prompted by Knight's story.

When questioned about the report, Nixon said he knew nothing of any movement for an Eisenhower-Nixon ticket.

Sen. McCarthy Defends Fight

CONVENTION HALL, CHICAGO (AP)—Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy told the Republican convention Wednesday that in the fight against Communism in government "there is a common-sense limit to gentleness and delicacy."

"In this fight against Communism," McCarthy said, "some of my good friends have accused me of being too tough. To them, I say there is a common-sense limit to gentleness and delicacy. That limit is where disloyalty and treason begin."

The Wisconsin Senator has been the storm center of controversy in which he has been accused in some quarters of "character assassination" and of using "loathsome 'guilt by association' tactics."

His opponents have asserted that many of his charges of treason in government, and Communist influence in the State Department were not supported by facts.

It apparently was to these criticisms that he referred in his address after receiving a noisy ovation when he stepped to the rostrum on the 25th Republican National Convention.

McCarthy said: "If I am wrong—if no treason is involved—if the last traitor left Alger Hiss—then the only answer for our loss and Russia's gain is that those in power are guilty of stumbling, fumbling incompetence."
