Republicans Attack HST Farmer Policy

By OVID A. MARTIN CHICAGO (AP) — The resolutions committee of the Republican National Convention Thursday accused the Truman administration of trying to destroy the farmers' freedom by making them dependent on government subsidies.

A GOP platform submitted to the national convention promised to free the farmer from this "threat" and to set up instead a federal farm program designed to give producers parity prices—the goal endorsed by both parties—at the market place.

Parity is a standard for measuring agricultural products, declared by law to be equally fair to farmers and to those who buy their products.

The GOP farm plank promised to set commodity loans, farm storage, farm credit, voluntary self-insurance, crop insurance, and federal price supports to seek full parity prices.

Price supports, it said, would be set at whatever levels were found necessary to maintain a balanced production and to stabilize farm income.

It did not commit the party to a 90 per cent parity support level promised by the Truman administration and recently set up for major crops through 1954 by action of Congress.

The platform denounced a controversial farm plan advanced three years ago by Secretary of Agriculture Brannan as a "fraud" on both the farmer and the consumer.

This plan proposed the use of subsidies to supplement farm income.

If a contractor fails to specify a subcontractor for any portion of the work to be performed, he shall be deemed to have agreed to perform such portion himself, and he shall not be permitted to subcontract that portion of the work except under conditions prescribed by law.

A 5% bid bond or certified check and the successful bidder will be required to furnish Surety Company 50% Performance and 50% Labor and Material Bond, and he shall be required to carry Public Liability Insurance as specified.

Senator Morse Opposed To Platform's Foreign Policy

CHICAGO (AP) — Sen. Wayne Morse (R-Ore.), defeated last month for Oregon's post on the National Republican Platform Committee, Wednesday criticized the committee's foreign policy and civil rights plank.

Morse, a member of the Oregon delegation, said he would not criticize the planks on the convention floor but he promised to "talk about it across the country for months to come."

Morse lost the seat on the platform committee at the Oregon delegation's organization meeting last month. Mark Hatfield, a young professor at Willamette University, Salem, Ore., defeated him.

Hatfield, who was a member of the subcommittee that worked on the civil rights and foreign policy planks, said they were "good constructive platform on which we can go to the people in 1952 and really fight."

Morse thought otherwise. "The foreign policy plank," he said, "is too risky and can be described as a slingshot, fence-jumping route for the party to travel in the fall campaign."

He was more critical of the civil rights plank. He said it fails to meet directly and head-on the issues that confronts the party in 1952. The Republican party should, as did Lincoln, its founder, take an unequivocal stand for complete federal protection of... citizen's rights without regard to race, religion or color. This proposed plank fails to do it.

Oregon's Gov. Douglas McKay was to have been a speaker in Wednesday's contest over seating the Georgia delegates. Time began to press, though, and he said he'd be glad to drop out as a speaker "as long as we win this fight."

On the Texas contest, State Sen. William Walsh led off by saying that if the right thing was to be done, the Eisenhower delegates would have to be seated. Earlier he had said the Taft case in Louisiana was so weak there should not have been a contest.

(Continued from Page One.) count, will be the third man nominated. Here's how it shapes up: Alabama, first to be called on the alphabetical roll call, will yield to Illinois to that state's Sen. Everett C. Dirksen who will nominate Taft.

California will nominate its own favorite son candidate, Gov. Earl Warren. Then Colorado will yield to Maryland, whose Gov. McMillin will put Eisenhower's name before the national convention.

The California delegation had a caucus and its chairman, Sen. William F. Knowland, told the members to hold their 70-vote line firm for Gov. Warren.

"If we are not swayed by rumor," Knowland said, "we have the opportunity to nominate Earl Warren for president."

The remark in Knowland's view, a distinct possibility of an Eisenhower-Taft deadlock. Harold Stassen told a news conference he was staying in the race. He has 25 committed votes.

Around Eisenhower's headquarters in a downtown hotel, there was a general atmosphere of confidence in victory.
