## Confidence Reigns In Both Camps

Champion Dick Wolfe and Challenger Earl Turner, principals in tonight's title squabble at the Armory, have one thing in common. They both think scheduling the championship fight over 12 rounds is designed for a knockout ending. And they're both lullaby-minded. More than that, both are in race-horse shape.

Turner shadow-boxed seven rounds Thursday night at the Armory and didn't draw a deep breath.

Both worked out last night, along with Blackie Vanderveer and Jerry Renaud, semi-windup and special event contestants.

It's the fourth meeting between Wolfe and Turner.

**NO KNOCKDOWNS**  
In 30 rounds of boxing neither has been knocked down, although all were sluggish from beginning to end.

The confidence in both camps gives one the idea the battle won't go the full distance.

The picture is changed in this fight. Last time out, just three weeks ago, Turner was the champion.

Tonight the Earl of Richmond is in the challenger's role and he's promised he'll go "all out" to regain his title.

He'll have to go "all out" because a champion has to be beaten; it's the tradition of the ring that in a close fight the champion gets the nod.

But this fight in a way changes the script because virtually the entire punch populace that jammed the Armory last time out felt Turner should have kept his title.

**SAFE SIDE**  
Both feel they'll have to score a knockout to be on the safe side. Unofficially at least, the bout isn't expected to go the route.

The match is a natural. Both are in grand shape.

Both are capable of cutting the bout short with a kayo wallop.

Both are a credit to the ring. Neither has turned in a bad bout here.

Boxing fans who miss this one will wish they hadn't.

Almost as much interest has been whipped up for the semi-windup that sends Ralph Weiser of nearby Beatty against Blackie Vanderveer of Seattle.

**SMOOTH**  
Vanderveer, a smooth workman, hit Weiser with every punch in the books last time they met here; Weiser couldn't locate Vanderveer to unload his deadly bombs.

But the Beatty Bomber still thinks he can win.

The special event puts Jerry Renaud, the Portland boy with the trip-hammer left jab, against Klamath Falls' Rudy Carlson.

The fours are Porky Jimenez vs. Phil Jackson and Danny Rios vs. Zane Mingo.

Gates open at 7:45 for the 8:45 opener.

The Forest Service asked postponement of the season until the rainy season begins, because of the danger of forest fires.

Judging by the brand of ball played by the New York Giants of late it appears the New Yorkers will have to stage another miracle run in order to win the National League pennant.

The Giants have lost six of their last eight starts and have fallen 5 1/2 games behind the front-running Brooklyn Dodgers.

New York expected to shake its slump at the expense of Pittsburgh's tail-end Pirates but instead the usually docile Pirates have won two straight.

**SAL LOSES**  
Murry Dickson beat Sal Maglie, 6-2, Friday, following Thursday night's setback when bunched base-running and fielding caused the Giants to drop a 12-inning encounter.

The Dodgers gained ground by edging the Chicago Cubs, 5-5. In other games, the Boston Braves lamed the Cincinnati Reds, 6-1 and the Philadelphia Phillies edged St. Louis, 4-3, in ten innings to snap the Cardinals' 10-game winning streak.

**UPSET**  
In the American League, the St. Louis Browns upset the pace-setting New York Yankees, 6-3, but the world champions retained their 2 1/2 game lead as the Washington Senators nipped the runner-up Chicago White Sox, 2-1, in ten innings.

The Boston Red Sox swept a doubleheader from Detroit, 16-6 and 5-3, and the Cleveland Indians downed the Philadelphia Athletics, 8-7.

## Beavers Divide With Oaks

It was an all-California first division again Saturday in the Pacific Coast League, with Lefty O'Doul's San Diego Padres virtually deadlocked with Oakland for first place, the Hollywood Stars down in third place, and Los Angeles fourth, six games off the pace.

Lowly Sacramento batted George Mungler out with a five-run assault in the sixth inning Friday night and whipped Hollywood, 7 to 2. The Stars got 10 hits but didn't get their first run until the seventh as Chet Johnson bore down in the pinches.

The Oaks split their doubleheader with Portland, taking the opener, 3 to 2, in eight innings, but losing the second, 9 to 3. The first game was scheduled for seven innings but was knotted at that juncture.

In the eighth, Loyd Christopher singled with the bases loaded and one away. The Beavers had things all their way in the nightcap.

San Diego took its third straight from San Francisco, 4 to 3, as Lou Stringer batted in three runs with a home run in the sixth inning. The Seals were ahead at that point, 3 to 1.

Los Angeles whipped Seattle, 6 to 4, and climbed back into first division as the Rainiers dropped into fifth place. Bob Usher, Gene Baker and Leon Brinkopf hit homers for the Angels. It was the 12th of the year for Baker and Brinkopf's 13th.

## Roseboro Gets Bat Award

San Roseboro, brilliant third baseman with the Klamath Gems last season and now second baseman for the San Jose Red Sox of the California League, was awarded the silver A. G. Spalding bat, emblematic of the rookie batting championship of all organized baseball in 1951.
