Group Lets Hiway Bids

PORTLAND (AP) — More than three million dollars worth of contracts for Oregon highway projects were awarded at the two-day meeting of the State Highway Commission here.

Friday awards totaled \$1,575,418. Most of that amount was for projects in the Marion County area. They include:

• Construction of a concrete shop building at Salem, awarded to Parker Johnson, Co., Portland, \$175,088.

• Grading and graveling sections of the Hayesville School-Turner Road unit of Salem by-pass section of Pacific Highway, awarded to Vernie Jarl, Gresham, \$200,770.

• Construction of Center Street Bridge approaches on the Salem-Dallas Highway at Salem, awarded to N. J. McDougal Co., Portland, \$564,677.

The commission referred to the State Board of Control for possible later award, the \$39,978 bid of Warren Northwest, Portland, to reconstruct Summer Street in Salem from Chemeketa to Center.

Other contracts were awarded to the lowest bidder.

Celebration In Abilene

ABILENE, Kas. (AP) — Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's nomination for President set off a rousing celebration in his hometown Friday.

Crowds gathered quickly in the downtown district as the news spread that General Ike had been standard bearer on the first ballot at the Chicago convention.

There was shouting — and happy smiles — on every side. People grabbed each other and pumped hands.

Blasts from the air raid whistle at the fire station and ringing of the fire alarm got the celebration rolling.

Russell Says He'll Beat Ike

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Richard Russell of Georgia congratulated Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower on winning the Republican presidential nomination and said Friday he'd welcome the chance to run against him in the fall.

Russell, a candidate for the Democratic nomination for president, said, too, he was sure he could beat Eisenhower.

Republican defeat was predicted by four candidates for the Democratic nomination — Sen. Estes Kefauver of Tennessee, Sen. Robert S. Kerr of Oklahoma, Mutual Security Administrator Averell Harriman and Sen. Richard Russell of Georgia. So did Gov. Adlai Stevenson of Illinois, mentioned as a possible draftee for the nomination.

Kerr told Washington newsmen Eisenhower would be "a sadder but wiser general" after Nov. 4, that "the Republican party's record will be a handicap greater than for generations." Arriving in New York Friday night, Harriman told reporters Eisenhower would be beaten "because of his ignorance on domestic matters."

Kefauver and Russell messaged congratulations to Eisenhower, that he can overcome. Later in New York, Kerr told a television audience Eisenhower will lose whatever he does.

Detroit saying "however they try to conceal it, the fact remains that the Republican party is still the party of grim reaction as it has. Each said they would be happy to campaign against the general this fall and beat him."

Kefauver declared in a statement that Eisenhower's nomination demonstrates that "in this critical year the rank and file members of both political parties are going to have their way in spite of the attempted obstruction of selfish political bosses."

Stevenson, in predicting Democratic victory, made what was interpreted as another effort to take himself out of the Democratic race. He said he "wants no other office than governor and hopes all convention delegates will respect his wishes."

President Truman sent word to newsmen that he had no comment on Eisenhower's victory. All along he has indicated he thought Sen. Robert A. Taft of Ohio would be easier to defeat than Eisenhower.

A close political associate of the President told a reporter Truman was determined that Democratic hopes must be tied to a fighting campaign based on an all-out "fair deal" platform. The informant asked not to be identified.
