LIVESTOCK

CHICAGO — Hogs, cattle and sheep were quoted nominally steady Saturday. Hogs were quoted nominally at a top of \$22.35 per hundredweight.

Hog receipts for the week were the largest since the first week of June, but shipping demand was broad.

Cattle receipts were irregular during the week and caused an irregular market. Compared with a week ago, steers weighing more than 1,150 pounds closed 50 cents to mostly \$1.00 lower. Steers weighing less than that and yearlings were steady to fully 50 cents up.

Heifers were strong to fully 50 cents higher, cows \$1.00 to mostly \$1.50 higher, bulls mostly 50 cents to \$1.00 higher, and vealers \$2.00 to \$3.00 lower.

Native spring slaughter lambs were \$1.00 and in some instances \$1.50 higher than a week ago. Old crop lambs and yearlings were strong to \$1.00 or more higher.

GRAINS

CHICAGO — Hedge selling against purchases of cash grain depressed wheat futures prices Saturday.

Corn was weak on larger receipts of 81 cars. Oats were steady early and then eased slightly.

Wheat closed 3/8 lower to 3/4 higher than the previous finish. July \$2.27 1/2, corn was 1/2 lower to 1/4 higher, July \$1.82, oats were unchanged to 3/8 off, July 78 3/4, rye was 3/4 off, soybeans were 1 1/4 up to 1/2 down, July \$3.27 1/2, and lard was unchanged to 8 cents 1/4 and hundred pounds lower, July \$11.15.

SIAC Trial Set Monday

A jury trial involving industrial accident compensation is scheduled for Monday morning in Circuit Court. The suit was brought by Charles W. Epperson, formerly of Klamath Falls and now of Roseburg, against the State Industrial Accident Commission, and is in court here on change of venue from Douglas County.

Epperson was injured June 2, 1948, while employed by the Klamath County School District as a laborer. His back and hip were hurt in a fall from a board.

He is seeking an increased disability rating from the Industrial Accident Commission.

Epperson is represented by Attorney William D. Ogden of Roseburg and the Anderson and Franklin law firm of Portland, while Assistant Attorney General T. Walter Gillard of Salem represents the State.

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
