Klamath Tribe Election Due

Voting members of the Klamath Indian Tribe are to select new tribal officers at a reservation-wide election Thursday.

Polling places are to be set up at Beatty, Sprague River and Chiloquin and the voting hours are 8 a.m. until 8 p.m., standard time.

Candidates for president of the Tribal Council are Seldon Kirk, Joe Ball Jr., Hiram Robbins and Tony Unive.

Delford Lang is unopposed for vice-president, and Dibbon Cook is the sole candidate for secretary.

There are three candidates for sergeant-at-arms, Wilbur (Buddy) Grim, Gilbert Nelson and Tony Brown.

An eight-member executive committee is to be chosen from among 16 candidates. The 16 are:

In addition, the Indians will vote on three propositions, two of them having to do with the size of the tribe.

One proposal, if approved, would forbid the enrollment as a member of the tribe any persons of less than one-quarter blood, born after June 30, 1952, and the second would forever close the tribal roll on June 30, 1955.

The third ballot proposition concerns the enrollment status of Dallas Givan.

French Heads Antelopes

LAKEVIEW—Giles French, publisher of the Sherman County Journal at Moro is Chief White Tail of the Order of the Antelope which will hold its 17th annual convention at the Blue Sky Hotel on the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service's Hart Mountain National Antelope Refuge July 18, 19 and 20.

The Order of the Antelope is an association for conservation of wildlife and other resources. The order was formed in 1932 when a group of men met on Hart Mountain to press for establishment of a refuge for protection of the fast-depleting antelope herds. The Refuge was established by President Roosevelt in 1936 as a result of the order's activities.

First Chief White Tail of the order was Marshall Dana, of Portland, formerly editor of the editorial page of the Oregon Journal. Dana will be master of ceremonies at the big campfire program and initiation ceremonies at Blue Sky Hotel the night of Saturday July 19.

The Order of the Antelope is sponsored by the Lake County Chamber of Commerce.
