### New U. S. Subs Add Strength To Undersea Fighting Force

PORTSMOUTH, N.H. (NEA) — The USS Tang is a sleek, ultra-modern submarine that can dive deeper, remain submerged longer, travel faster and fight better than any other undersea craft in the world. That's how the Navy proudly describes the latest addition to America's formidable submarine fleet. Built at the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard as the first of a new class, the USS Tang is the namesake of a submarine which blazed a spectacular combat record during World War II. The new Tang has greater maneuverability, more endurance and can travel faster underwater than on the surface. The Tang's Snorkel "breathing device," developed by the Germans during the last war and later perfected by the U.S., enables it to remain underwater for lengthy periods while recharging its batteries. Armed with an extensive variety of super-secret electronic devices, the Tang is 268 feet in length, shorter than any of her war-time predecessors and carries a crew of

seventy officers and 75 enlisted men. It was designed as a fast-attack submarine. It has a streamlined hull and reduced superstructure to enable it to dart more swiftly through the water than any other American sub ever built. The Tang's primary purpose will be offensive action against enemy surface and underwater craft. Diving in the Tang is like being in a room without windows. Unless someone told you the sub's location, you'd have no idea you were far below the surface. There is no trouble breathing, no pressure, only the sound of water flooding the ballast tanks and Navy gibberish over the loudspeakers. As an example of the vessel's maneuverability, the Tang raced ahead at full speed along the surface. Suddenly the skipper, Comdr. Enders P. Huey, called for a quick reversal. Within one minute, the Tang was "dead in the water," prepared to travel in any direction. One of the outstanding features of the new submarine is its compactness. There are men everywhere—bending, stooping, crawling all over each other. Everybody has a gauge to watch, a lever to pull, a valve to turn or an order to give. Confusion to the landlubber, but efficiency to the submariner. The Tang ticks like a clock. Each piece of equipment, from the radial-type Diesel engines to the shiny coffee percolators, was designed especially for the Tang-class submarine which is roomier than any of the older-type subs, despite its smaller size. Ask any man aboard the Tang how he feels about his ship, and he'll tell you she's the best. But you don't have to ask the stocky, red-haired Huey—he leaps at every chance to tell you she's "real hot." He doesn't mean the temperature (the Tang has the latest air-conditioning) but he means that his pride and joy has more power, more endurance, greater maneuverability and dives deeper than any other American submarine.

## New Record Marked Up For Northwest Forest Receipts

A new record for receipts from the national forests of the Pacific Northwest region has been reported by Regional Forester J. Herbert Stone of the U. S. Forest Service. There has been an increase of more than 4 1/2 million in fiscal year 1952 over 1951, the previous record year.

Receipts from the 19 national forests in Washington and Oregon from July 1, 1951 to June 30, 1952 total \$30,811,161. For the same 12-month period a year ago the receipts were \$26,244,065. Most of the revenue comes from timber sales, with the balance derived from grazing fees, special uses, water power rights, and minor miscellaneous sources.

Thirteen forests have now passed the million dollar mark in receipts. Leading all others, as it did last year, is the Willamette with headquarters at Eugene, Oregon. This forest has received \$3,571,834. The Olympic national forest, with headquarters in Olympia, Washington, was second high in the region with receipts of \$3,631,946.

Other forests which passed the \$2 million mark are the Gifford Pinchot of Vancouver, Washington with \$2,504,172; the Umpqua of Roseburg, Oregon, with \$2,188,650; and the Mount Hood of Portland, Oregon, with \$2,017,993.

Twenty-five percent of national forest receipts are apportioned for roads and schools to the counties

in which each forest lies. Record receipts this year will mean a total of about \$7,702,790 will be apportioned to those counties which contain national forest land in the
