U.S. Demands Reds Cease Pamphlet Publication Here

WASHINGTON (AP) — The State Department ordered the Russian embassy Monday to quit publishing and distributing pamphlets in the United States.

Fair Trade In Effect

WASHINGTON (AP) — From now on, retail price cutting on trademarked or brand name merchandise is illegal in any of 45 states if manufacturers first fix prices by agreements with one or more retailers within a state's boundaries.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Millard Caldwell said Monday civil defense funds voted "by a shocked and aroused Congress" after bombs fall would be useless and bitterly criticized lawmakers for not providing money now.

It said the twin actions were taken because the Russians were obstructing distribution of "America" in the Soviet Union.

In halting the "America" project, the department gave up operations on the last remaining wedge into the Iron Curtain.

A spokesman said the slick-paper magazine was so popular in the Soviet Union that newstands sold out all copies within a few hours after they went on sale wherever the Russian government did not interfere.

Second-hand copies were sometimes sold on the black market at many times the original price of ten rubles.

The suspension action was taken, the department said, because of "progressive restriction" by Russian authorities against "America," a lavishly-illustrated monthly patterned after Life magazine.

In a note addressed to the Russian Foreign Office, the State Department asserted:

"As a result of this obstruction, the number of copies which can be presumed to reach the Soviet public has become so small as not to justify this effort of the government of the United States to supply Soviet readers with a true picture of American life and thus to promote understanding between the two peoples."

The retaliatory action prohibits the embassy from publishing and distributing in this country the "U. S. R. Information Bulletin" and any other Russian pamphlets.

The Soviet Information Bulletin is a slick-paper English-language magazine which purports to tell of life in the Soviet Union.

It is sometimes illustrated and features pictures of Russian workers.

In the past the Russian embassy also has published from time to time pamphlets that gave the texts of speeches by Russian officials.

These were sent to reporters, libraries and any American who showed interest in them.

The State Department raked Russian government publications

for what it described as a violent propaganda attack against "America," said, was begun in 1947 and accused "America" of a "lying, rotten, bourgeois journalism," and of being "decadent."
