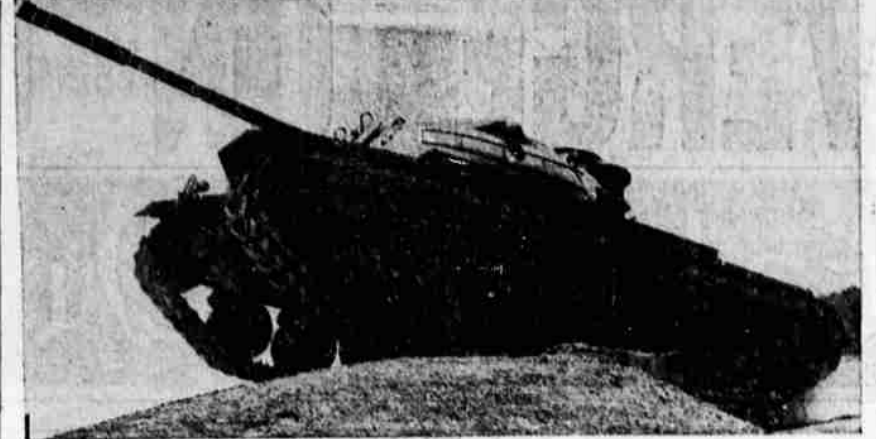

New Tank Adds Army Strength

 NEWARK, Del. (NEA)—America's tank program since the Korean War started comes closer to meeting original goals than any other major part of the big armament buildup.

Revelation by the Army here that mass production is now under way in the Chrysler Delaware plant on the brand new medium Patton T-48 climaxes this program. The new Patton's revolutionary features are also expected to put U.S. ground forces in front of other nations in quality tanks for the first time.

In a few months a total of five major tank plants will be in operation in the country. And the most significant aspect of the whole program is that these new plants will be capable of increasing output many times in case of the need for total mobilization. Creation of such reserve facilities is the essence of the present over-all buildup of the services.

Cooperation of the big automobile firms with Army Ordnance engineers has been a big factor in making all of this possible.

Chrysler started from scratch after the Korean outbreak to aid the Army in the development of the new medium T-48. And details of the new heavy T-47 will soon be revealed. It will also be produced in this new plant.

In Cleveland, O., the Cadillac company has been turning out the lighter Walker Bulldogs in great numbers for many months. And the Ford and Fisher Body plants

Standard Oil Buys Land

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Standard Oil Company of California Monday announced the purchase of about 2,000 acres of land in Snohomish County, Washington, as a possible site for future construction of an oil refinery.

The purchase price was announced as approximately \$900,000. The site is southwest of Palms Field, 20 miles north of Seattle.

"Our company hasn't any plans of any kind now for the use of this tract," President T. S. Peterson said.

"However, the way the Pacific Northwest is growing, both in population and industry, indicates to us that sooner or later it may be desirable to build a refinery there to take care of the expansion of our business."

"This site seems to us to be well suited, not only for a refinery but also for other petroleum operations, including tankage and distribution. It has a partial frontage on Puget Sound."

If constructed the refinery probably would supply Alaska as well as the Northwest.

Escape Try Proves Fatal

SALEM, Ore. (AP)—Harold Allen Hayes, a 20-year-old convict, suffocated in a 15-inch sewer pipe Monday in a daring but futile escape attempt.

Another convict, Franklin Clingenteel, 17, also was involved in the attempt.

His calls that he was stuck in the narrow pipe, five feet underground, brought guards to the prison yard manhole which the two convicts had hoped was the way to freedom.

They had planned to worm their way through the pipe to another manhole outside the prison walls—a fourth of a mile away.

They entered the pipe about noon. Several hours later guards were called to the manhole by Clingenteel's shouts. Later he freed himself and came up through another manhole in the prison yard.

He told guards that Hayes had gone on ahead. They dug down and smashed pipe sections until they found Hayes' body 375 feet from the manhole.

Both men were in prison on burglary convictions. Clingenteel had served 17 months of a two-year sentence and Hayes, four months of a three-year sentence.

Warden Virgil O'Malley said two other convicts escaped from the nearby prison farm during the excitement.
