Malin Hurler Gets Class A WIL Chance

Wayne Rick, big Malin hurler who pitched the high school Mustangs to Klamath County and District titles this year, was signed by the Salem Senators yesterday.

Rick has given up plans to attend Oregon State College to throw in with the Class A club of the Western International League.

Rick went to Salem recently on a look-see basis. Salem Manager Hugh Luby liked his looks and signed him up after he pitched the eighth and ninth innings against the House of David Monday night, hurling hitless ball and walking just one batter.

Rick will be on the inactive list for the moment but said Luby was trying to make room for him on the playing roster.

The 6-2, 180-pounder said Detroit of the American League had an agreement with Salem whereby the Tigers had first chance to pick him up if he makes good in the Western International League.

Rick jumps from high school baseball into Class A after notching a 9-1 record with Malin, going unbeaten until the State playoffs. Salary terms were not disclosed.

He reports Tuesday when Salem, now on the road, returns home.
