Mossadegh Resigns As Iranian Premier

TEHRAN, Iran (AP)—Premier Mohammed Mossadegh, emotion chief of Iranian nationalism, resigned unexpectedly after a dispute with Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi and parliament Thursday night to choose a successor.

The resignation, which plunged near-bankrupt Iran into a new ministerial crisis, was announced at a closed session of parliament Thursday morning by Hussein Ala, the minister of court, representing the Shah.

One deputy said the message from the palace disclosed that the 22-year-old premier quit last night after the Shah refused to agree to let him become minister of war as well as premier in the new government.

The dispute apparently occurred during a conference between Mossadegh and the monarch Wednesday.

Mossadegh sent his letter of resignation Wednesday night, apparently without informing some of his closest supporters. Several deputies arriving for the meeting of the Majlis (lower house) expressed surprise when informed of the resignation.

Squads of police and soldiers patrolled the parliament area as well as strategic spots throughout the city, but there were no reports of any disorders.

Some observers speculated it was unlikely—although still possible—that Mossadegh would again be reappointed by the Majlis, which less than two weeks ago voted that he remain head of the state.

Among names most prominently mentioned as a possible successor to Mossadegh was that of former Premier Ahmed Qavam. Qavam, a 77-year-old rightist politician, was premier in 1946.

State Fire Prevention Crews Reported in Top Preparedness

SALEM (AP)—An army of 1,600 men and a few women, with two million dollars to stand the backing of 75,000 men of the logging industry, is better prepared than ever to deal with the forest fires expected on Oregon's state and private lands in the next two months.

State Forester George Spaur, who returned only two weeks ago from 20 months of Army duty watching atomic bomb explosions in Nevada, says his staff is better prepared because of the extensive educational program carried on by his men with the logging industry.

The worst fire weather in 35 years occurred last year, and 125,000 acres of state and private timber lands were burned over. Of this amount, 92 per cent of the burning occurred on lands for which logging operators are responsible.

With that bitter memory behind them, the state forestry men held 22 meetings last spring with operators to teach them how fire prevention pays them dividends.

Spaur says the response was good, and that 90 per cent of the operators are cooperating.

Before a logging operator can go to work, he has to get a permit from the forester. These permits are granted only after the operator shows he has equipment to fight fires. There have been 11,750 permits granted this year.

Assistant State Forester J. H. Walker heads the protection division. He has three district supervisors under him. Then there are 32 enforcement officers and 15 local wardens.

When a fire breaks out, the warden is responsible for putting it out. Everything is thrown into the fight to quench the fire while it's small.

All fires are reported to the Salem headquarters, which acts as a general staff. It dispatches crews, as well as supervisory personnel.

There are 32 crews stationed in the forests, plus two state crews. The 32 crews are hired by district associations, which are cooperative organizations with the logging industry. All timber operators, some of whom have firefighting organizations of their own, pay assessments of up to 15 cents an acre for fire protection. This amounts to one million dollars a year. Other money for fire fighting includes \$653,000 in federal funds, and \$350,000 appropriated by the Legislature.

The state Forestry Department works closely with the Federal Forest Service.

Of the 1,000 persons on duty all the time, 600 are hired by the state and 400 by the associations. But all are considered state employees.

The state has 134 lookouts stationed on lonely peaks. Some of these are high school and college students, and Walker says 18-year-old girls make the best lookouts because they are the most responsible.

Spaur says the Keep Oregon Green program has paid big dividends in educating people about

how to prevent fires. "Thirty or 40 or 60 in a tent has brought good results, too," he adds. "We won't put up with any slack methods of logging."

There are 280 employees in the Salem headquarters, in a many of whom work at insect control, rehabilitation, farm forestry, and other activities not connected with fire fighting. But every one of them is subject to calls to the fire lines.
