Oregon Man Killed In Flaming Crash

LOS ANGELES (AP)—An Oregon insurance man, his bride of a month and her parents died Thursday as their light plane, taking off into a heavy fog, hit two houses on the edge of an airport. No one was injured in the house. Occupants of the one most badly wrecked are on vacation. It was set afire.

The pilot was identified as Dale E. Baker, 38, Grass Valley, Ore., insurance man and ranch owner. With him were his bride, the former Marie Joanne Jones, 31, and her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jackson P. Jones of Gresham, Ore., near Portland.

Mrs. Florence Joyce Jones, the bride's mother, is a Gresham schoolteacher.

The family had been visiting relatives in nearby Inglewood. They left Gresham July 17. In the wreckage, littering the street outside the two houses, police found an album of pictures of the Bakers' wedding.

David C. Johnson, an aircraft worker and World War II fighter pilot, said he heard the plane in an apparent power dive.

"His controls must have been frozen," said Johnson. "I knew nobody would be doing acrobatics in that overcast. So I just waited for the crash."

One neighbor, Mrs. Mav Palmer, said: "I was looking out the window to see if it was going to rain. I heard a terrific crash and saw a body go flying by."

The plane had scraped the roof of the home of Sam Caldwell on bus El Segundo boulevard, then cartwheeled into the living room of the house next door.

But it tore right out again, and spread debris into the street. The engine was 73 feet from the fuselage.

Caldwell, his wife and baby, were in their house but escaped injury.

The next-door neighbors, Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Corley, left last Saturday on a vacation trip to Mena, Ark.

It was the second instance in as many days of a plane hitting a house in the metropolitan area. In Santa Ana, Wednesday afternoon, a Navy jet lost a wing and ploughed into a residence, wrecking it while its owners were out shopping.

Witnesses said the pilot could have bailed out but stayed with his craft in a desperate effort to bring it down safely.

Debris from Thursday's crash littered the street for half a block.

The plane caught fire as it hit, and the interior of the one-story house was badly scorched before firemen arrived. Windows were shattered in both homes.

At Northrop airport, from which the craft took to the air moments before the crash, Baker had been given instrument clearance for a take-off for Fresno, Calif. They said they believed he was flying a charter party. His craft was a four-place Stinson.

More Power Links Slated

SEATTLE (AP)—Contracts to build two more links in a \$14,000,000 transmission line from Coulee Dam to Western Washington were awarded to a Washington and an Oregon firm, V. M. Murray, Northwest manager for the Bonneville Power Administration, announced Thursday.

A contract for 4.6 miles in the center of the remaining section went to Smith Brothers of Vancouver, Wash., on a low bid of \$1,124,051.

Montgomery Electric of Portland got the contract to build a 38.9-mile section from Columbia Slation near Wenatchee, westward. The two sections are to be completed in 480 days.

The new line which will conduct 300,000 kilovolts of power, compared to the previous 230,000-kilovolt capacity lines, will be the largest transmission line ever built, Murray said. A kilovolt is a thousand volts.

BLM Adds Employees

PORTLAND (AP)—The Bureau of Land Management forestry division has expanded its staff to speed salvage of damaged timber to fight the Douglas fir bark beetle infestation.

Rogee Bell, the bureau's northwest regional administrator, said wind-damaged, and fire and insect killed timber on bureau land now is estimated at about one billion board feet. It is valued at about 16 million dollars.

The beetle infestation is estimated at 1 1/2 million acres of private timber, 1 million acres of national forest and 600,000 acres of BLM timber, Bell said.

He added that entomologists have recommended the removal of infested trees as the best way to fight the beetle epidemic.

Expansion of the BLM forestry staff was made possible by an appropriation of funds by Congress, Bell said. The new foresters have just completed a training course at Swissboro.

Washingtonians Lose \$500,000

OLYMPIA (AP)—Washington residents and their visitors lost or destroyed half a million dollars or more in 1952 and 1951.

That was the face value of 166 million sales tax tokens that disappeared during the 18 years they were in use.

No one knows for sure what became of them.

In a final report on the tokens—they were discontinued last year—the Tax Commission merely said the missing discs were "lost or destroyed in circulation."

Some were saved for souvenirs. Others were stacked up for poker chips. Many were used as washers. Thousands of them were combined with small headed nails and used as roofing nails during the metal shortage.

The tokens were made of aluminum, plastic and fibre.

Individually they were worth less than a cent. Collectively, the Tax Commission said they were worth \$551,652.

"If you need proof that little things count up, this is it," quipped D. R. Johnson, secretary of the tax commission.

Communists Draft Chinese

HONG KONG (AP)—The Chinese Communists have drafted 200,000 peasants as forced labor to build a 100-mile railway along the Fukien province coast, opposite Nationalist Formosa, say news dispatches from Canton.
