

RUSSIA LEADS ON GYM SWEEP

Three Yankee Discus Throwers in Finals

HELSINKI (AP)—Three American discus throwers pitched their way into the final of the Olympic championship last Tuesday, but but America's best gasman failed in his second bid for a place in the single sculls final.

Fortune Gordien of Minneapolis, world-record holder in the discus, needed three throws to achieve the required distance in Tuesday morning's qualifying round, but he finally made it with a heave of 163 feet, 1.84 inches.

That left him some five feet behind Adolfo Consolini, Italy's defending champion, but it topped the best efforts of the other two Americans, both of whom qualified with their first throws and didn't try any more.

Slim Iness of the University of Southern California did 160 feet, 8.23 inches and Jimmy Dillon of Alabama Polytechnic Institute and Upper Sandusky, Ohio, pitched 157 feet, 2.65 inches.

These marks were comfortably beyond the minimum distance of 150 feet 11.06 inches required to qualify for Tuesday afternoon's final.

Jack Kelly of Philadelphia and the U. S. Navy gave rowing fans one of their most thrilling spectacles in his "repechage" or second-round heat in the single sculls, but the finish photos showed he was beaten by Theodor Kocera of Poland.

Moore tied the Olympic record of 30.8 seconds for the 400-meter hurdles which he set in Sunday's trials.

And Biffle took the broad jump after U.S. Champion George Brown fouled three times.

NY Wins 'Series Preview'

The 48,200 spectators who watched the New York Yankees defeat the Brooklyn Dodgers, 5-3, in an exhibition at Yankee Stadium Monday night may have been seeing a preview of the 1952 world series.

Certainly it will require some mighty big dougs by any of the other contenders to knock either the Yankees or Dodgers off the top perch. The Yanks headed West Tuesday with a comfortable 4 1/2-game margin over their nearest competitor. The Dodgers arrived home Tuesday with a commanding 7 1/2-game bulge over the defending National League Champion New York Giants.

Of the two, the Yankees appear to have the tougher task ahead. Starting with a two-night double-header in Cleveland Tuesday evening, the world champions will pack 21 games into the next 17 days. There isn't an off day anywhere on the trip.

Brooklyn and the Giants open up 14-game home stands Tuesday night. The Dodgers start with Cincinnati and the Giants take on the St. Louis Cardinals.

The impression is that if the Giants are going to sell another 1951 miracle finish, they'd better start right away instead of waiting until Aug. 11, as they did last year. The Dodgers appear unstoppable right now. They've been playing at a sensational 728 clip, only a few points off the record set established by the Chicago Cubs of 1906.

Gems Stadium Foreclosure Steps Open

Klamath Baseball bondholders last night appointed a five-man bondholders protective committee to supervise the disposition of Gems Stadium.

But their first job will be—and it was expected to be done this morning—to start foreclosure proceedings. Klamath Baseball Inc. is bankrupt but this will make it official.

The five men elected are Wall Beane, Henry Seaton, Kenneth Lambie, Dick Maguire and Merle West.

This committee will represent some 55 bondholders who hold \$31,100 worth of bonds that are worthless unless Gems Stadium is put to money-making use.

And that precisely is what the committee has in mind after the foreclosure proceedings, a legal "must," are completed.

The bondholders present last night at the meeting in the Commercial Arts Building, heard many suggestions but no definite conclusion was reached.

They all agreed that "we want to keep it as an athletic field"—if not baseball than something else to entertain Klamath Falls sports fans.

The United States gained one spot in the rowing finals when Chuck Logg, Jr., son of the Rutgers University Coach, and Tom Price, another Rutgers student from Eatontown, N. J., won their repechage heat in the event for pairs without coxswain.

The American pair with coxswain, James Pifer and Duval Rech, both members of the Stanford crew, was eliminated in a close race by Germany.

QUALIFY TWO

The Russian track and field team, second to the United States in the unofficial point tabulations, qualified two men in the first half of the field for the discus final.

They were Otto Orizalka, who placed in the shot put Monday, and Boris Butenko.

In the over-all point scoring, including all Olympic events, Russia is ahead of the United States. The Soviet athletes scored heavily in gymnastics Monday to offset the American margin in track and field.

The United States is expected to regain some of this loss in the point duel in Tuesday afternoon's track and field finals.

In addition to the discus, America has three of the top performers in the pole vault and two stars, including defending champion Mal Whitfield of Columbus, O., in the 800 meters final.
