

Renaud In Tomorrow

KO Seen In Weiser Scuffle

The Northern ring contingent that invades the Armory Friday night is expected to pitch camp here tomorrow afternoon.

The party will have Portland's Jerry Renaud and his handler, Harry Maguire; Seattle's Pat Mahoney, Chu Chu Benson and Millard Johnson and Handler Bob Work.

The four fighters occupy top bout spots Friday against representatives from the Klamath Basin.

Renaud meets Beatty's Ralph Weiser in the 10-round main event. Mahoney tangles with Bruce Miller, Chillicothe, in the six-round semi-final.

Benson and Klamath's mauling millhand, Rudy Carlson, are down for the six-round special event.

The third six-rounder shows Johnson against Klamath Falls' Darrell Harrington.

GOOD LEFT

Renaud is the lad who kept his left glove in Carlson's face so monotonously on the July 12 card. Carlson thought it was part of his face.

The ringwise call Renaud "Oregon's best lightweight." Whether he is or not is open to debate, but one thing is sure: He's got the best left jab seen here in many seasons of box-fighting.

Weiser hits hard with either hand and, gaining confidence on his cut-throat reversal over Blackie Vanderveer last time out, thinks he can whip Joltin' Jerry.

Renaud carries more than a fifty left jab. He used it to set Carlson up then dumped Rudy on his face with a whistling right uppercut.

HITS HARD

He can hit, although perhaps not with the emphasis Weiser can. It shapes up as a bout that can well end before the scheduled 10 frames.

Mahoney is the boy who pounded Kid Pollard on a recent card. Miller holds a draw with Pollard.

Benson and Johnson are Negroes with reputations for doling out two-fisted punishment. But Carlson and Harrington both are capable of ending things ahead of time.

Two four-rounders complete the card, tickets for which are on sale at Dick Reeder's, 5th and Main.

Shriners Restrict Scouting

PORTLAND (Special)—Since the game was inaugurated in 1946, more than \$20,000 has been turned over to the Northwest unit of the Shriners' Hospital for crippled children in receipts from the annual football game between the Oregon and Portland All-Stars.

The figure is sure to exceed \$100,000 following the fifth annual renewal of the rivalry here at Multnomah stadium Saturday night, Aug. 23.

The money which accrues from this outstanding attraction is the reason the game has been designated "Football's Finest Hour."

Each year the Shrine game attracts to Portland countless scouts and coaches from every leading collegiate institution in the Pacific Northwest.

Several Shrine game alumni have been among the most coveted collegiate prospects on the Pacific Coast, including Sam Baker of Oregon State, Al Hansen of Southern Methodist, Pat Duff of Southern California and George Shaw of Oregon.

ATTENTION

Players participating in this year's game also will draw the attention of college coaches. Among the heralded prospects who will perform here on Aug. 23 are Dick Pavlat of Astoria, John Keller of Grant, Tex. Kirkendall and Lou Loftland of Rosevelt, Charley Rosenbaum of Princeville and Joel Sappentield of Washington.

So many Shrine game players have moved into regular positions in collegiate varsity lineups that a widespread campaign is now in force to urge Oregon's most outstanding graduated seniors to remain in Oregon for their college careers.

IMPARTIAL

Shrine game officials are strictly impartial about the college choices of their all-star athletes, but in recent years the attention these players have drawn has interfered with their practice work for the Shrine game.

A strict rule will be enforced this year which will keep the players out of any contact with college officials or representatives while they are practicing in Portland.

Tickets for the Shrine game are moving steadily and another big crowd is anticipated for the 8:30 p.m. kickoff as well as the traditional pre-game concert. Reserved seats, priced at \$3, may be obtained by writing Shrine game headquarters in the Jackson Tower building.

Shantz 13 from 30 - Game Goal

Baseball fans looked back to Tuesday night's thrill-packed action and cracked "what, no no-hitter?"

That's about the only thing that didn't occur in the Major League. And that, too, came within one pitch of being accomplished.

The star of that pitching feat was Virgil Trucks, already the author of the American League's sole no-hitter this season. The Detroit Tiger righthander gave up just one hit, a single by Eddie Yost in hurling the Tigers to a 1-0 victory over the Washington Senators.

Yost's hit came on Trucks' first pitch of the game. It was a slow-moving grounder between short and third. Trucks held Washington

hitless May 15, winning 1-0.

Other highlights included: New York's Yankee swept a double header from the vanishing Indians before 57,666 crushed Cleveland fans, 7-3 and 8-1, to increase their first place margin over Boston's Red Sox to five games.

Bobby Shantz continued on his way to his 30-victory goal, pitching the Philadelphia Athletics to a 5-2 win over the St. Louis Browns. Shantz yielded eight blows for his 17th triumph against three losses.

Dave Koslo registered his fifth straight success over the St. Louis Cardinals this season, his 12th in a row over them in three years as the New York Giants earned a 3-2 triumph on Hank Thomson's two-run homer in the sixth.

Brooklyn's Dodgers met a four-run 10th inning by Cincinnati with a five-run outburst of their own to nip the Reds, 7-6, and retain their seven and a half game bulge over the Giants in the National League race.

Vern Bickford and the Boston Braves spotted the Chicago Cubs a 4-0 lead on Doc Fondy's grand slam homer and came back to win, 6-4.

The Philadelphia Phils climbed to the .500 mark with a double win over Pittsburgh, 14-4 and 8-1 and moved to within a game of the fourth place Cubs.

Rookie Dick Gernert rapped a two-run homer in the 13th to give Boston a 4-2 triumph over the Chicago White Sox.
