What's more nobody is sure if the fight ever got out of the newspapers and off the ground. Weather bureau statistics show that it more or less rained and shined when nature felt the urge.

Judge Denies Hiss Trial

NEW YORK (AP) — Federal Judge Henry W. Goddard Tuesday denied Alger Hiss another new trial of his perjury conviction. Hiss had blamed "forgery by typewriter" for the conviction.

Hiss, now serving five years in federal prison, pleaded that he had new evidence that it was possible to take the typewriter which was a vital piece of evidence against him.

However, Judge Goddard ruled: "There is no newly discovered evidence which would justify the conclusion that it were presented to a jury, it would probably result in a verdict of acquittal."
