Any combination of 18 Pirate losses or Brooklyn wins will do the job. As the Pittsburgh lads (10-3) with Brooklyn play 11 more with the Dodgers, it shouldn't take too long.

After Wednesday night's loss to Philadelphia, 4-1, Pittsburgh rested 41 games behind Brooklyn with 89 to play.

Brooklyn lost to Cincinnati 5-4, 10-2.

Because New York and St. Louis were idle, the Dodgers lost only a half game of their National League lead, now measuring seven games.

At Boston, the Chicago Cubs ripped into Max Surkont and three others for 13 hits and 6-2 victory.

Just when the New York Yankees were ready to land a knockout blow on Cleveland, the Indians bounced back behind Bob Lemon to win, 7-3. Coming after Tuesday's double loss, the Tribe still trailed by 6 1/2 games in fourth place.

CLONE IN

Boston closed to within four games of the Yanks by blasting seven runs in the ninth inning at Chicago for a 10-4 decision.

Washington remained in a challenging position, only six games back, by besting Detroit in 16 innings, 5-2.

Starter Alex Kellner and winner Bob Hooper held St. Louis to four hits as the Philadelphia A's handed the Browns their seventh straight defeat, 3-2.
