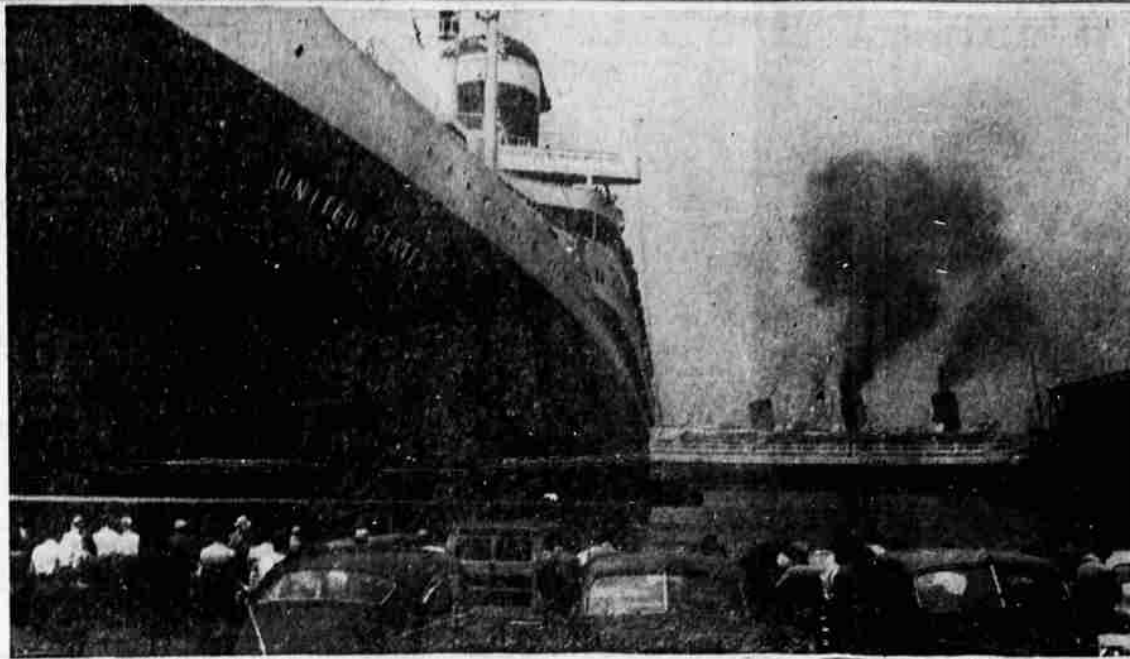

## 7th Army Boss Named

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Army Friday named Lt. Gen. Charles L. Bolte as commander of the 7th Army in Europe.

Bolte, who is now deputy chief of staff for plans and research here, will replace Lt. Gen. Manton S. Eddy on Aug. 5. Eddy's new assignment will be announced later.

In other changes, the Army announced that Bolte's present staff post will be filled by Maj. Gen. Lyman L. Lemnitzer, who was until recently commander of the 7th Division in Korea.

Lt. Gen. Thomas B. Larkin, assistant chief of staff for logistics, will retire Dec. 31 after more than 40 years of service, the Army said. He will be succeeded by Lt. Gen. Williston B. Palmer, commander of the 10th Corps in Korea.



## Marine Has Good Record

WITH U. S. FIRST MARINE DIVISION, Korea (AP) — A sharp-shooting sergeant using a fellow Marine as a decoy claims a perfect but highly unofficial record — nine Chinese snipers killed with nine bullets.

But the company commander put a stop to the bizarre tactics. The Marines released the story Friday:

Sgt. John E. Boltfoot of Chicago, a medal-winning marksmen, and Pfc. Henry A. Friday of Neokosa, Wis., were stationed on an outpost far forward of the Marine Division's main line of defense. They devised this deadly game: Friday, acting as a decoy, would expose himself until a Chinese sniper opened fire.

Boltfoot, armed with a rifle mounted with a sniper-scope, would fire just once and exclaim "scratch one" enemy.

Boltfoot said "the whole idea started one day when Friday made the mistake of standing up in the trench. A sniper fired at him and I fired back. I killed him."

Friday volunteered for decoy duty. In two days they set a "remarkable if highly unofficial record" of nine Chinese snipers slain with nine bullets. The men said they checked their kills with a powerful telescope.

## FBI Announces Top Arrest

WASHINGTON (AP) — George Arthur Heroux, one of the FBI's 10 most wanted criminals, was captured Friday near Miami, Fla.

FBI chief J. Edgar Hoover reported. Heroux, 22, was sought for two big bank robberies in Missouri and Kansas.

Hoover said the youth was apprehended Friday morning by the El Portal police department on the suburbs of Miami.

Heroux was sought on charges of robbing the South Side bank in Kansas City, Mo., of an undisclosed amount of money last Nov. 10, and of making off with \$2,000 in currency from the Johnson County National Bank in Prairie Village, Kans., last Nov. 23.

## Iran Army Clubs Close

TEHRAN, Iran (AP) — Maj. Gen. Wayne Zimmerman, head of the U. S. Army mission in Iran, Friday ordered the closing of officers' and non-commissioned officers' clubs in the wake of anti-American demonstrations spurred by Communists.

The newly opened American club available to all U. S. citizens living in Tehran was also closed. The step was taken to prevent any heavy concentration of Americans in one spot that would make them a target for demonstrators in this tense city.

The action was taken after Premier Mohammed Mossadegh's new national police chief warned Iranians that Communists are attempting to use the Nationalistic outbreaks, which drove ex-Premier Ahmed Qavam from power, to further "sinister" Red aims.

## Steelmen Eager To Get To Work

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Philip Murray's 600,000 strike-idled CIO United steelworkers eagerly awaited Friday the green light which will start them back to work after the costliest steel strike in history.

Murray, head of both the CIO and the steelworkers, called his 175-man wage policy committee to Washington to formally approve the pact he and leaders of six major steel firms agreed on at the White House Thursday.

Strike-idled steelworkers throughout the land greeted the announcement enthusiastically.

At Birmingham, Ala., newspaper offices answered scores of calls. Many of the callers asked: "When do we go back to work?"

At Gary and East Chicago, Ind., the picketing continued — but changed from a grim business to a parade of smiles.

Among the happiest people were 2,500 supervisory workers — who have been inside the big Inland Steel Co. plant at East Chicago since the strike started. They anticipated a long weekend with their families.

The Gary Chamber of Commerce estimates 20 million dollars in pay checks have been lost in that city which is a steelmaking center.

About 4,000 steelworkers have been getting welfare help there. Throughout the country the 600,000 striking steelworkers lost an estimated 350 million dollars in wages.

Furloughed workers in railroads, coal mining, and steel fabricating industries lost uncounted millions more.

The number of idle grew to almost two million, including the workers laid off in allied and steel using industries.
