## US, Japs Mix In Cup Play

CINCINNATI (AP) — The long hard road that leads toward victory in the famed Davis Cup tennis matches opens here Friday for Japan and the United States.

The one-time opponents in a serious shooting war were to face each other across a tennis net at the Cincinnati Tennis Club in the first two singles matches of the Davis Cup zone competition. Play was to begin at 2 p.m.

Jiro Kumamaru, Japan's No. 1 player, was to face Art Larsen, the unpredictable San Leandro, Calif., star in the opening singles match while Vic Seixas of Philadelphia, America's No. 1 player, was paired against Atsushi Miyayuki, 20-year-old "freshman". The order will be reversed in the remaining two singles duels Sunday.

The doubles match will be played Saturday. It apparently was a cinch that Billy Talbert of New York, the U. S. team's captain, and Gardner Mulloy of Miami, Fla., would represent the United States.

The Japanese declined to name their doubles combination pending outcome of Friday's singles.

The Giants almost made up more ground but Brooklyn came back to shade Cincinnati, 2-1, on Duke Snider's 11th inning homer after the Reds had won the first half of a doubleheader, 3-2.

Ed Mathews, a top candidate for National League "rookie of the year" hit his 10th homer and later scored on Walker Cooper's double in Boston's 3-1 victory over the Chicago Cubs.

The Phillies and Pittsburgh were not scheduled.

Talk of a New York Yankee runaway in the American faded as Cleveland handed Tom Morgan a 4-2 loss in his last ball game before joining the Army.
