# Russians Show Cage Savvy

## Americans, Reds Both Notch Hoop Victories

HELSINKI (AP) — Russia's basketball team made its first appearance in the Olympic tournament Friday as it whipped Bulgaria, 74 to 46, in a first round game. The big, fast Russian team looked impressive after the United States, defending champion and favorite, had turned in an undistinguished performance in beating Hungary, 66 to 48. The Russians showed plenty of court savvy and plenty of strength on the bench, using twelve players who scored about equally. In other first round games, Uruguay defeated Czechoslovakia, 53-51, in an overtime period and Argentina routed the Philippines, 83-59.

## Ashenfelter Runs Record Steeplechase

HELSINKI (AP) — Horace Ashenfelter, the galloping FBI man from Glen Ridge, N.J., won the Olympic 3,000 meter steeplechase Friday. It was the first time an American has won the Steeplechase since the modern Olympic games began. Ashenfelter's time was 8:43.8, breaking the Olympic record. This was the fastest time this event ever has been run in track history. There is no official world record for the Steeplechase because courses vary.

## Mathias Trails Campbell

HELSINKI (AP) — Marjorie Jackson of Australia equalled the world mark for the women's 200 meter dash Friday. Miss Jackson, who already has won the 100 meter title in world record time, was timed in 23.6 seconds to tie the world record set by Stella Walsh in 1938. This was the 20th Olympic record to be broken in men's and women's track and field events. Two have been tied. Four world records have been broken and one equalled.
